Naytlh - 'a "We Carry the Children"



Our home visiting program provides parenting and life skills for successful and positive parenting. We serve native families that are either expecting or have infants under the age of twelve months, continuing through the child's third birthday. We travel throughout the 11 county service areas of the Confederated Tribe of Siletz Indians. The model and curriculum we provide is called Family Spirit and was developed by the John Hopkins Center for American Indian Health. We are funded by the Tribal Maternal, Infant, Early Childhood Home Visiting Program (TMIECHV).

Family Spirit is Evidence based and culturally sensitive to native families. Parents gain knowledge and skills for their developing infant through 36 months of age. We also focus on goals and healthy living for parents as a support system for the family as a whole. The program consists of 63 lessons over a 39 month period and is divided into six modules. The modules are broken into these categories: Prenatal care (9 lessons), infant care (16 lessons), your growing child (11 lessons), toddler care (9 lessons), my family and me (6 lessons), and healthy living (12 lessons). While this may seem like a big commitment the lessons vary from 30 minutes to 90 minutes and some can be combined together as we work with your schedule. Family Spirit suggests we deliverer at least 32 lessons to our families in order for families to benefit from the evidence based curriculum. For the full benefits of the program we would like to provide all 63 to our families. As a thank you for participating in our program we offer some incentives which we will be happy to share with you upon the enrolled in our program.

During your participation if you feel like the timeline of lessons is too often we can adjust the home visits to accommodate your schedule while still keeping the programs timeline in mind. We are a voluntary program that delivers home visits in the comfort of the homes of our families. If you would like to get more information and or meet our home visiting staff would love to schedule a home visit to give you a full overview of the program.

HIGHER EDUCATION

FULL TIME STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. All full-time students are required to file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by January 31st each year. A copy of your FAFSA Award Letter must be submitted to your respective Education Specialist along with your completed Tribal Scholarship Application. You can fill out your FAFSA application online at www. FAFSA.gov. Applicants who neglect to file for 2016/2017 FAFSA by January 31, 2016 will not be considered for a Tribal scholarship for the 2016/2017 school year.
- 2. Students, not the school, are responsible for having your grade reports and class schedules sent to your respective Education Specialist as soon as they are available at the completion of each term/semester.
- 3. All full-time students must maintain at least a 2.00 GPA and complete a minimum of 12 credit hours per term/semester.
- 4. Students who do not meet the minimum academic requirements will be placed on academic **probation**. Full time students who are placed on **probation status** and do not meet the minimum standards of a 2.00 and 12 credit hours in their following full-time term may be placed on Suspension status.
- 5. TRIBAL SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS WILL NOT BE ISSUED UNTIL GRADE REPORTS /TRANSCRIPTS AND CLASS SCHEDULES HAVE BEEN SUBMITTED TO YOUR EDUCATION SPECIALIST.

Application Deadline:

Students are funded for the academic year once per year; the deadline for completed applications is June 30, 2016. Adult Vocational Training clock hour schools are considered on a case by case basis.

If you are planning to attend Higher Education or Adult Vocational Training fall term 2016, and If you plan to attend school at the University of Oregon, Lane Community College, or Linn-Benton Community College, your completed application should to be addressed to the attention of the Education Specialist at the Eugene Area Office. The Siletz area office handles out of state schools. Completed grant applications must be submitted for each school year. DP is available to any tribal member who has obtained full time employment and applies within seven days of the hire date. Service provides clothing and tools necessary for work.

Work Experience (WEX)

WEX can be used to obtain current training and skills to be a valued employee. 480 hours paid at minimum wage. Contact Sheila Solis for more details.

Siletz Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation Program

The Siletz Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation program (STVRP) is here to assist members of any federally recognized Tribe (living within the Siletz Tribes service area) with overcoming impediments to employment. We work with a diverse population of individuals who have disabilities ranging from cognitive impairments to physical limitations.

If you have a documented disability that creates limitations or prevents you from doing the work you desire or are qualified for we would like to assist you. We can assist with obtaining and maintaining employment and developing skills. We focus on motivation, identifying your abilities, skills that lead to successful employment and the development of self advocacy.

You should have a strong desire to work and be willing to work collaboratively with STVRP staff to provide you with the services needed to overcome your disability. Your personal goal should be self sufficiency and to live a healthy sustainable lifestyle.

The STVRP also assists transitioning students with disabilities. The ideal age for a student to start working with VR is two to three years before graduation, until the age 22, or graduated from high school. Our program can provide vocational guidance and counseling; assist with identification of employment goals; employment retention; and advocacy within the academic environment. Students with a documented disability or who are on an "Individualized Education Plan-IEP" or on a "504 Plan" are encouraged to participate in the STVRP.

- Portfolio Building, Resume Writing, Interviewing Techniques, Job Coaching
- Culturally Relevant Individualized Services
- Evaluations and Assessments

You could be eligible for STVRP services.

Steps in working with Siletz Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation Program: (STVRP)

- **Step 1:** Establish contact with the STVRP Counselor assigned to your school and schedule a meeting. Your first meeting with a STVRP Counselor will be to gather information about you, your needs, and to discuss whether the STVRP fits for you. If the program is for you......
- **Step 2:** Sign an application and a STVRP Counselor will determine whether or not you're eligible for services by talking with you about your needs, your disability, and what barriers you have as a result. They may also need to do some additional testing and will read through your school records.
- **Step 3:** Once you're eligible, you'll meet with your STVRP Counselor to discuss your goals and plans for employment. STVRP Counselors can provide guidance and counseling to students who need help determining their goals or plan for what they want after high school.
- **Step 4:** You'll also work with your STVRP Counselor to discuss the impact of your barriers as you work to reach your employment goals and determine what services are necessary to help you reach your goals.

Winter Safety & Car Seats

As the coldest part of winter approaches, parents everywhere bring out their babies' winter coats or snowsuits to keep baby warm during travel. However, thick winter coats or snowsuits can compromise your child's car seat safety. In order for a baby car seat or toddler booster seat to function properly, the straps need to remain tight against the child's chest. Winter coats and snowsuits make car seat safety difficult because they change the way a child fits into the car seat. When the car seat straps don't fit the child properly, there is a chance the child could be ejected from the car seat.

Car Seat Safety Experts Say Coat Compression is Dangerous

Jen Ellis, a mother and certified Child Passenger Safety Technician from Meridian, Idaho, makes a point each winter to educate parents in online forums about winter coats and car seat safety. "It is unsafe to put a thick coat, snowsuit, or blanket on under the harness of a car seat," Ellis says. "In a crash the coat would compress, making the straps too loose and possibly allowing the child to be ejected from the seat."

The car seat harness needs to stay close to the child's body at all times. All coats and clothing will compress in a crash, but thicker winter coats and snowsuits could compress enough to create a lot of slack in the harness, allowing the child to be ejected from the car seat.

Check All Winter Coats for Car Seat Safety

It's easy to check and see whether a baby's winter coat or infant snowsuit is too thick to be safe in a car seat. This test will show you how thick the coat is and how much the coat will compress during a crash.

- 1. Take the car seat into the house.
- 2. Put the winter coat or snowsuit on the child.
- 3. Put the child in the car seat and buckle the harnesses as you normally would before car travel. Adjust the straps to the appropriate fit for your child.
- 4. Take the child out of the car seat without loosening the straps at all.
- 5. Take the coat off your child.
- 6. Put the child back in the car seat and buckle the harnesses again, but do not tighten the straps.
- 7. If you can fit more than two fingers under the harness at the child's shoulder bone, the coat is too thick and is not safe for use with the car seat.

Keep Baby Warm and Safe

Even if you can't safely use your child's winter coat in the car seat, there are ways to keep baby warm when temperatures drop. Here are Ellis's ideas for ensuring your baby is warm and safe in a car seat.

- For babies in an infant seat, dress them warmly in normal clothes, like a shirt, sweatshirt, long pants and a hat. Buckle the child into the infant seat, then cover the baby with a light blanket tucked around the sides. **Make sure nothing is behind baby's back!** Finally, add another heavier blanket over the top of the infant seat.
- Also for infant seats, there are car seat covers available that fit over the whole infant seat once the baby is buckled in. These covers have a peep-hole so that baby's face remains uncovered. Ellis advises parents to be sure the child is buckled up under the cover, though, as it's easy to forget when the buckle is out of sight.
- For older babies and toddlers, take the child's coat off before buckling them into the car seat. Once the harnesses are secure, put the child's coat on backwards over their arms to keep them warm without compromising safety.
- Whenever possible, warm up your car before putting the baby in the vehicle.
- When buying winter coats, keep thickness and car seat safety in mind. Polar fleece jackets and snowsuits are warm but thin, making them a smart choice for winter baby wear.

BLACK PEPPER BEEF AND CABBAGE STIR FRY

2 TABLESPOONS VEGETABLE OIL

4 CLOVES GARLIC MINCED

1/2 LB GROUND BEEF

1/2 HEAD CABBAGE SHREDDED

1 ONION CUT INTO STRIPS

2 TABLESPOONS SOY SAUCE

1 TEASPOON CORN STARCH

1/2 CUP WATER 1 TABLESPOON BLACK PEPPER

DIRECTIONS:

1. HEAT WOK OR LARGE SKILLET OVER MEDIUM HIGH HEAT AND ADD OIL. SAUTE GARLIC FOR ABOUT 5 SECONDS, AND THEN ADD THE GROUND BEEF. STIR IN CABBAGE AND ONION AND PEPPER AND COOK UNTIL VEGETABLES ARE TENDER AND BEEF IS FULLY COOKED. STIR IN SOY SAUCE. MIX TOGETHER CORNSTARCH AND WATER, AND STIR IN. SEASON WITH PEPPER. COOK, STIRRING UNTIL SAUCE HAS THICKENED.


This is so good and easy to make. You can add some bell pepper for color and serve it over rice.


