#### Ready!

At a minimum, you should have the basic supplies listed here: Water (1 gallon per person, per day outside the home, and a 2-week supply for home), Food (non-perishable, easy-to-prepare items ideally a 3-day supply for outside the home and a 2-week supply for inside the home). **Your basic kit will include:** 

A Flashlight with extra batteries, battery-powered or hand-crank radio (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible) extra batteries, first aid kit, medications (7-day supply) and medical items, multi-purpose tool, with can opener, sanitation and personal hygiene items, copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information,

proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies), your cell phone with charger, family and emergency contact information, extra cash, emergency blanket, for everyone in household.,maps of the area, etc.

Place all of these items in a back pack and for easy access, place it where everyone in the household knows where it is. Continue to work on the 2-week supplies for your home, but try and complete your 3-day emergency kit as soon as possible with the items you have around the house. Then, when you can, you should budget for the items you don't have and purchase one each month till you feel prepared in case an emergency disaster situation occurs. Be safe and make a plan with your family members. Talk about it!

Many of our clients don't take their crackers because they are not salted or have no flavor. One of our clients does this with the crackers that he receives each month. Now he can't keep enough crackers in the house. Experiment and come up with your own flavors.

#### **Snack Crackers**

- 1 PACKAGE OF RANCH DRESSING MIX
- RED PEPPER FLAKES (TO TASTE)
- 1 SLEEVE CRACKERS
- 1/4 TO 1/2 CUP OIL (VEGETABLE, OLIVE OR GRAPESEED)

Put crackers in zip lock bag. Drizzle with the oil and add the powdered ranch dressing mix and red pepper flakes. Seal the bag with some air in it and turn it over until the crackers are coated. Let stand for a day (any longer and they become stale). You can also substitute garlic powder and parmesan cheese in place of the ranch dressing mix and red pepper flakes. Experiment with your favorite seasonings and enjoy.

#### **Adult Education**

Provides funding to Siletz Tribal members to obtain their GED, access training courses, and skill building classes to help broaden or upgrade employability.

#### **Higher Education**

Provides funding to Siletz Tribal members who are or will be enrolled in a secondary education program (Community College or University) leading to a four year degree. Applicants must meet two deadlines. The first is to have completed your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by January 31, 2016. The second is to complete a Siletz Tribal Higher Education Application with accompanying documentation by the deadline of June 30, 2016. #### **Adult Vocational Training**

The Adult Vocational Training program of the Tribe funds Siletz Tribal adults who are seeking specific vocational training for up to two years

#### **Youth Programs**

The Siletz Johnson O'Malley/Supplemental Education Program serves Native American youth who are enrolled in a federally recognized Tribe, or are able to show proof of at least one quarter Indian blood, and attending a public school, from 3 years old to 19. The program provides assistance for school fees, pre-school, enrichment, cultural classes, sports and more. After school tutoring is offered and can be arranged. College and career planning and advocacy for your child at your local school is available. For an application or more information please contact Katy.

#### Siletz Tribal Youth Activity

Funds programs for Siletz tribal youth in the many areas such as: sports, music, camp fees, lab fees, shop supplies, graduation, educational /scholastic materials, cultural supplies and materials, correspondence courses, and extra curricular supplies. ### Vocational Rehabilitation (STVRP)

The Siletz Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation program (STVRP) is here to assist members of any federally recognized Tribe (living within the Siletz Tribes service area) with overcoming impediments to employment. We work with a diverse population of individuals who have disabilities ranging from cognitive impairments to physical limitations.

If you have a documented disability that creates limitations or prevents you from doing the work you desire or are qualified for we would like to assist you. We can assist with obtaining and maintaining employment and developing skills. We focus on motivation, identifying your abilities, skills that lead to successful employment and the development of self advocacy.

You should have a strong desire to work and be willing to work collaboratively with STVRP staff to provide you with the services needed to overcome your disability. Your personal goal should be self sufficiency and to live a healthy sustainable lifestyle.

The STVRP also assists transitioning students with disabilities. The ideal age for a student to start working with VR is two to three years before graduation, until the age 22, or graduated from high school. Our program can provide vocational guidance and counseling; assist with identification of employment goals; employment retention; and advocacy within the academic environment. Students with a documented disability or who are on an "Individualized Education Plan- IEP" or on a "504 Plan" are encouraged to participate in the STVRP.

Examples of Services provided by STVRP:

- Guidance and Counseling
- Referral to Services
- Employment Services
- Portfolio Building, Resume Writing, Interviewing Techniques, Job Coaching
- Culturally Relevant Individualized Services
- Evaluations and Assessments
- Training Placement Opportunities
- Adaptive Equipment

## Elk Tag Opportunity

The Tribal Natural Resources Department will once again be offering a limited number of Landowner Preference (LOP) elk tags to Tribal members for this fall's hunting season. As a landowner, the Tribe is eligible to participate in the State's LOP program. Based on the number of acres that the Tribe owns, we can get 6 additional antlerless elk tags from the State. These LOP tags are not related to the Tribe's Consent Decree tags that we receive each year. They are based solely on the Tribe being a landowner.

There are a number of important differences between the LOP tags and the Tribe's regular tags. These are summarized in the table below.

	Tribal Tags	LOP Tags
State Hunting License Required?	No	Yes – Tribal member must purchase both a 2016 and a 2017 State hunting license
Area to be Hunted	Anywhere within the specific tag's hunt boundaries	Only on Tribal land within the unit selected during that unit's antlerless elk season. Units available include Up- per Siletz, NW Alsea, SW Alsea, SW Alsea Private Lands and West Siuslaw
Eligible for other State elk tags?	Yes	No*
Give tag to another licensed Tribal member to hunt for you?	Yes	No
Application and Selection Process	Apply to Tribe for Tribal draw- ing	Apply to Tribe for LOP Drawing; if selected apply to State for controlled hunt tag (list LOP unit in LOP section on State controlled hunt application)
Obtain Tag From	Tribe	State – Tribal member must purchase tag

<sup>\*</sup> Note: If you are drawn for an LOP Tag you are still eligible to apply for and be drawn for a Tribal tag.

Please note that a major difference between the LOP tags and the Tribe's regular tags is

that ONLY the person drawn for the tag can hunt that tag. The tag cannot be given to someone else to hunt for you. Therefore, only those folks serious about hunting this hunt themselves are eligible to apply. The drawing for the 6 LOP elk tags will be held at the Natural Resources Committee Meeting to be held on April 11<sup>th</sup> at 4:45 PM in the Natural

Resources Department Map Room. Applications are available on the Tribal website and at the Tribal Natural Resources Office in Siletz. Completed applications are due in the Natural Resources office by 4:30 PM April 8, 2016. ## 2016 Summer Internship Program

Students attending college can apply for the Tribe's 2016 College Students Summer Internship Program. To be eligible you must be at least a half-time student and in good academic standing.

Applications will be mailed to known students, but if you do not receive an application, please contact Assistant General Manager Bonnie Petersen or the Education Specialists at any tribal Area Office to request an application. This program assists tribal students with locating internship placements to gain work experience in their field of study. There are nine slots available for 2016. Students may work up to 368 hours at minimum wage and can be placed within or outside of the Tribe. Stu-

dents selected for the program must complete an orientation, criminal history background check, and drug screening (Note: the Tribe does not recognize Oregon laws allowing the use of medical or recreational marijuana). Placements can begin in June, but must be completed by September 30, 2016.

## Temporary Tribal Student Assistance

The Siletz Tribal Housing Department's Temporary Tribal Student Assistance Program (TTSAP) will be accepting applications for the 2016-2017 academic year. Applications will be accepted from **April 1, 2016 to May 2, 2016.** Program Information:

- The TTSAP assists Tribal Students who will be attending a college, university, vocational or trade school.
- The TTSAP is a time-limited program. Funding is for one academic year.
- The TTSAP assists students with rent or room and board in a dormitory.
- The student's share of the rent is thirty percent of their adjusted annual income.

Important Note: The student might be required to remit a portion of the rent. For example, if a student is working the wages will affect the student's share of the rent.

Assistance is not transferable.



## **Tobacco Prevention Education Program (TPEP)**

The number of poison center calls involving e-cigarettes went from one call per month in September 2010 to 215 calls per month in February 2014.

#### Apply Now for Siletz Tribal Head Start's 2016 - 2017 School Year

It's time to apply for your child to attend the Siletz Tribal Head Start program for our upcoming 2016 – 2017 school year. If your child will be 3 or 4 years of age as of September 1, 2016, they are eligible to enroll in the Siletz Tribal Head Start Program. Call us at 1-800-922-1399 and ask for Head Start to request an application.

There are new enrollment requirements that all Head Start Programs must meet. All Head Start Programs are now required to conduct either a face-to-face or tele-

phone interview with all applicants to verify the information on their child's application. So, when you return your application, we will be calling to verify the information with you.

This new requirement must be met before we can select your child for enrollment into our program. If we are unable to reach you, we will leave a detailed message asking you to call us back. Please call us back as soon as possible so we can finish processing your child's enrollment application. This is a mandatory requirement we must meet and we are unable to enroll any child until we complete this verification process.
