477-Self Sufficiency Program Offers Summer Youth Employment Program

The 477-Self Sufficiency Program (SSP) has openings for our Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP). This Program is separate from the Tribal Employment Program offered through the Education Department.

The Program mission is to give youth ages 14-24 the opportunity to gain employment or education skills in a field that interests them. Our current placements are 240 hours and pays minimum wage. The Program is only available to those youth that reside within the 11-county service area.

Basic eligibility criteria includes:

- Youth must be between 14-24 at the time of application
- Native American verification (includes Native American, Native Alaskan and Native Hawaiian) and those enrolled in a federally recognized Indian Tribe. Participants can also be eligible with verification of descendancy from a family member who is enrolled with a federally recognized Tribe.
- Latest school grade report (for youth who have not yet graduated). Participants will need to have cumulative Grade Point Average (G.P.A.) of 2.0. Participants below a 2.0 can participate in a classroom training program and receive a stipend while they attend summer school.
- Family income must fall below the approved income guidelines used by 477/SSP.

Slots are limited and are on a first come, first serve basis. If you are interested in applying for the Summer Youth Employment Program, please contact one of our Intake Specialists/Job Coaches located in each of the Tribal offices.

Program will start accepting applications on May 1, 2016 until July 15, 2016.

The Tribal Natural Resources Committee and Natural Resources Department will sponsor the first "Cut Wood For The Elders Day" of the year on Saturday, May 21st. The woodcut will be held on the Tribc's Logsden Road Property between the Tribal Food Distribution Warehouse and the Tribal Vehicle Storage Yard in Siletz. We need lots of volunteers to help cut, split and deliver firewood for Tribal elders. Bring your chainsaws, hydraulic wood splitters, splitting mauls, axes, and lots of energy. Even if you don't have any of those we can use the moral support! Lunch, drinks, and snacks will be provided. We will start at 8:00 AM and go until mid-afternoon.

The goal of this event will be to deliver firewood to as many elders as possible. The Elders' Program maintains a list of elders that burn wood for their winter heat. People willing to haul firewood to elders outside of the Siletz area, please contact the Elders Program Clerk at 1-800-922-1399 ext. 1261 or 541-444-8261 to be paired up with an elder in need. We especially need folks who can haul wood to the Eugene, Salem, and Portland areas. Elders in need of firewood should also contact the Elders Program Clerk to get their name on the delivery list.

If you have parents or grandparents that burn wood in the winter to stay warm, you need to help out at this event! Come help replenish those wood piles for the coming winter. There will be two other woodcuts this year on July 16th and on September 17th.




We currently have additional gym membership stipends available.

HIGHER EDUCATION/ADULT VOCATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM

The next term we will be funding will be Fall Term 2016. The deadline for Fall Term is June 30, 2016. All documentation has to be turned in by that date to have your application considered complete. To be eligible to receive Tribal education funding you had to have completed your FASFA by January 31, 2016

ADULT EDUCATION

The Adult Education program is for Siletz Tribal members, 16 years or older, who are not already enrolled in a formal education program. The Adult Education program can assist with the following: Obtaining GED, certificates, or otherwise raise levels of educational achievement through adult classes to improve employment status through education/training. Siletz Tribal Youth Activity Fund

Helps to fund programs for Siletz tribal youth in the many areas such as: sports, music, camp fees, lab fees, shop supplies, graduation, educational /scholastic materials, cultural supplies and materials, correspondence courses, and extra-curricular supplies. Siletz Tribal members from kindergarten to high school can access up to \$75.00.

Siletz Tribal Head Start Program

Is a preschool program for children 3 to 4 years old. The Salem Center has AM and PM classes. It operates Monday through Thursday for 3.5 hours a day. Transportation depends on residency, which will be determined after acceptance. Register in Spring for the following school year. Apply Now for Siletz Tribal Head Start's 2016 - 2017 School Year

It's time to apply for your child to attend the Siletz Tribal Head Start program for our upcoming 2016 – 2017 school year. If your child will be 3 or 4 years of age as of September 1, 2016, they are eligible to enroll in the Siletz Tribal Head Start Program. Call us at 1-800-922-1399 and ask for Head Start to request an application.

There are new enrollment requirements that all Head Start Programs must meet. All Head Start Programs are now required to conduct either a face-to-face or telephone interview with all applicants to verify the information on their child's application. So, when you return your application, we will be calling to verify the information with you.

This new requirement must be met before we can select your child for enrollment into our program. If we are unable to reach you, we will leave a detailed message asking you to call us back. Please call us back as soon as possible so we can finish processing your child's enrollment application. This is a mandatory requirement we must meet and we are unable to enroll any child until we complete this verification process.

Tribal Maternal, Infant, & Early Childhood Home Visiting Program

Naytlh - 'a "We Carry the Children"

Our home visiting program provides parenting and life skills for successful and positive parenting. We serve native families that are expecting or have infants under the age of twelve months, continuing through the child's third birthday. The model and curriculum we provide is called Family Spirit and was developed by the John Hopkins Center for American Indian Health. We are funded by the Tribal Maternal, Infant, Early Childhood Home Visiting Program (TMIECHV).

Family Spirit is evidence based and culturally sensitive to native families. Parents gain knowledge and skills for their developing infant through 36 months of age. We also focus on goals and healthy living for parents as a support system for the family as a whole. The program consists of 63 lessons over a 39 month period and is divided into six modules; Prenatal Care, Infant Care, Your Growing Child, Toddler Care, My Family and Me, and Healthy Living. Lessons vary from 30 minutes to 90 minutes and are delivered in the comfort of your home.

As a thank you for participating in our voluntary program we offer some incentives which we will be happy to share with you upon enrollment in the program. If you would like to get more information and or meet our home visiting staff we would love to schedule a home visit to give you a full overview of the program.

Lori Christy and Tricia Brown are the new Home Visitors in the Salem Area Office. They work with families in Salem, Portland and surrounding areas.

Hi, I'm Lori Christy and I am excited to join the Home Visiting Team serving out of the Salem Area Office. I have worked with young children and families for many years and am glad to have this opportunity to meet new families and share this great curriculum with them.

Siletz Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation Program

The Siletz Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation program (STVRP) is here to assist members of any federally recognized Tribe (living within the Siletz Tribes service area) with overcoming impediments to employment. We work with a diverse population of individuals who have disabilities ranging from cognitive impairments to physical limitations.

If you have a documented disability that creates limitations or prevents you from doing the work you desire or are qualified for we would like to assist you. We can assist with obtaining and maintaining employment and developing skills. We focus on motivation, identifying your abilities, skills that lead to successful employment and the development of self advocacy.

You should have a strong desire to work and be willing to work collaboratively with STVRP staff to provide you with the services needed to overcome your disability. Your personal goal should be self sufficiency and to live a healthy sustainable lifestyle.

The STVRP also assists transitioning students with disabilities. The ideal age for a student to start working with VR is two to three years before graduation, until the age 22, or graduated from high school. Our program can provide vocational guidance and counseling; assist with identification of employment goals; employment retention; and advocacy within the academic environment. Students with a documented disability or who are on an "Individualized Education Plan- IEP" or on a "504 Plan" are encouraged to participate in the STVRP. Examples of SERVICES PROVIDED by STVRP:

- Guidance and Counseling
- Referral to Services
- Employment Services
- Portfolio Building, Resume Writing, Interviewing Techniques, Job Coaching
- Culturally Relevant Individualized Services
- Evaluations and Assessments
- Training Placement Opportunities
- Adaptive Equipment

Want help getting a job? Do you have a diagnosed disability (IEP or 504)?

You could be eligible for STVRP services.

Steps in working with Siletz Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation Program: (STVRP)

Step 1: Establish contact with the STVRP Counselor assigned to your school and schedule a meeting. Your first meeting with a STVRP Counselor will be to gather information about you, your needs, and to discuss whether the STVRP fits for you.

If the program is for you.....

Step 2: Sign an application and a STVRP Counselor will determine whether or not you're eligible for services by talking with you about your needs, your disability, and what barriers you have as a result. They may also need to do some additional testing and will read through your school records.

Step 3: Once you're eligible, you'll meet with your STVRP Counselor to discuss your goals and plans for employment. STVRP Counselors can provide guidance and counseling to students who need help determining their goals or plan for what they want after high school.

Step 4: You'll also work with your STVRP Counselor to discuss the impact of your barriers as you work to reach your employment goals and determine what services are necessary to help you reach your goals.


