October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Breast cancer affects one in eight women during their lives. Breast cancer is the most common form of cancer among American women. Awareness Depot donates a percentage of this sale to the Susan G. Komen Foundation to help fight breast cancer. You can show your support by displaying breast cancer awareness product such as pink ribbon pin, pink awareness bracelets etc..

A pink ribbon is the most prominent symbol of breast cancer awareness. Pink ribbons, which can be made inexpensively, are sometimes sold as fundraisers.

The pink ribbon is associated with individual generosity, faith in scientific progress, and a "can-do" attitude. It encourages consumers to focus on the emotionally appealing ultimate vision of a cure for breast cancer, rather than on the fraught path between current knowledge and any future cures.

During Breast Cancer Awareness Month each October, people raise money by organizing activities such as theme parties or a "pink day" (when employees wear pink clothing or accessories) at work. The money raised is donated to the organizers' choice of breast cancer care or research programs.

Blue Corn Mush Recipe

Bring 4 cups water to a boil, just before water boils, slowly whisk in 1 cup Ute Mountain Bow & Arrow brand blue corn meal. Reduce heat to medium and continue to cook to desired texture, whisking constantly. Stir in 1 teaspoon kosher salt and 2 tablespoons Red Lake Nation organic maple syrup. If available add 1/2 teaspoon fine cedar ash as water is coming to a boil to increase blue vibrancy and give a nice hint of smoke. Serve with chopped pecans and toasted pine nuts and add your favorite fruit to complete your nutritious meal.

There is the most awesome restaurant in Denver, Colorado, called Tocabe. Their recipes are made up of traditional foods from their tribal background, with a modern flair. They have partnered with USDA and mid-west Tribes, to show people how to use their commodities in a healthy way. Since USDA has added the blue cornmeal to our food package and many of the people from our area don't know how to use it, I contacted them and asked if they had a recipe using the product. They shared this with me and I can't wait to try it. When I do get a chance to try it, I am going to substitute the fruit & nut mix that is in our food package for the chopped pecans and toasted pine nuts that their recipe calls for.

A home fire is a devastating event, and one that you never count on happening. Your children are most at risk when this disaster occurs. In fact, children under five are twice as likely as other people to die in a home fire. Tragically, many home fires are started by children playing with dangerous household items -- especially lighters and matches. Taking sensible precautions in the home and teaching your child how to escape from a fire can help your family avoid this type of heartbreak.

Help Your Child Survive a Fire

- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, inside bedrooms and outside sleeping areas. Once a month check whether each alarm in the home is working properly by pushing the test button. Replace batteries in smoke alarms at least once a year. Immediately install a new battery if an alarm chirps, warning the battery is low.
- Teach your children what smoke alarms sound like and what to do when they hear one.
- Ensure that all household members know two ways to escape from every room of your home, and where to meet up outside.
- Practice your fire escape plan at least twice a year and at different times of the day. Practice waking up to smoke alarms, low crawling and meeting outside. Make sure everyone knows how to call 9-1-1.
- Emphasize "get out, stay out." Only professional firefighters should enter a building that is on fire—even if other family members, pets or prized possessions are inside.
- Use quick-release devices on barred windows and doors. Security bars without release devices can trap you in a deadly fire. If you have security bars on your windows, be sure one window in each sleeping room has a release device.
- Consider getting escape ladders for sleeping areas on the second or third floor. Learn how to use them, and store them near the windows.
- Teach household members to STOP, DROP and ROLL if their clothes should catch on fire.

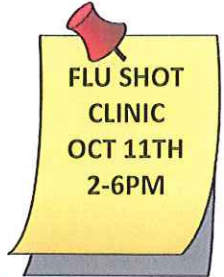

HIGHER EDUCATION/ADULT VOCATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM

The deadline to apply for 2017/2018 year was June 30, 2017. The next deadline to apply is June 30, 2018. **It is a requirement that you complete your FAFSA by January 31, 2018 to be eligible to receive tribal assistance.**

The applications for FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) open on October 1, 2017. The Tribal deadline to complete your FAFSA will remain January 31st, but please turn in your application early. Federal money is on a first come first serve basis and given out until gone. Without completing your FAFSA by the January 31 deadline, you will be ineligible to apply for Tribal Higher Education funding for fall.

ADULT EDUCATION

The Adult Education program is for Siletz Tribal members, 16 years or older, who are not already enrolled in a formal education program. The Adult Education program can assist with the following: Obtaining GED, certificates, or otherwise raise levels of educational achievement through adult classes to improve employment status through education/training. There is no deadline to apply for classes. For an application, please call **SONYA** at (503) 390-9494.

Siletz Tribal Youth Activity Fund

Helps to fund programs for Siletz tribal youth in the many areas such as: sports, music, camp fees, lab fees, shop supplies, graduation, educational /scholastic materials, cultural supplies and materials, correspondence courses, and extra-curricular supplies. Siletz Tribal members from kindergarten to high school can access up to \$75.00.

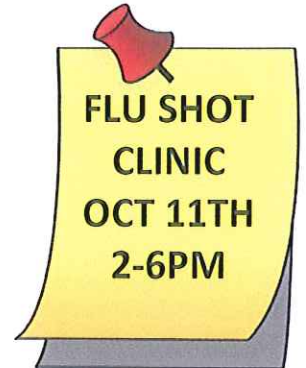

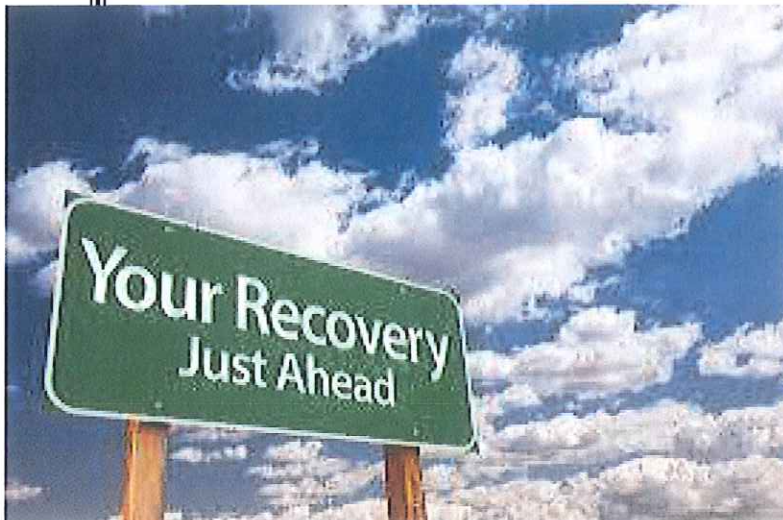

Entering fall:

The weather is cooling, the leaves are turning colors, and the rains are coming back. It has been a hot summer, and fires have devastated the wild areas we hold dear. The Run to the Rogue being canceled was a sad though understandable occurrence.

Coping with the change of season:

- 1) The days are going to start getting shorter, the skies more frequently darkened by clouds, and it will become increasingly important to maximize the daylight hours.
- 2) Exercise remains important but harder to come by with the rain; try inside activities such as using a step or similar to do step aerobics while you watch your favorite shows.
- 3) As the daylight decreases, if you notice your mood decreasing with it, try spending a few moments each day in front of a UV light source.

Mental Health Awareness in October:

October is a month to take mental health into consideration on a National level, as the first week of Oc-

tober is considered "Mental Health Awareness Week" by NAMI, the National Alliance on Mental Illness. Companies across the nation are holding various mental health awareness activities, and some clinics are offering free depression screenings. 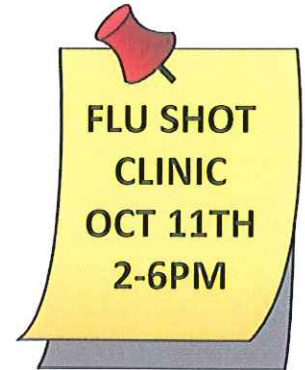

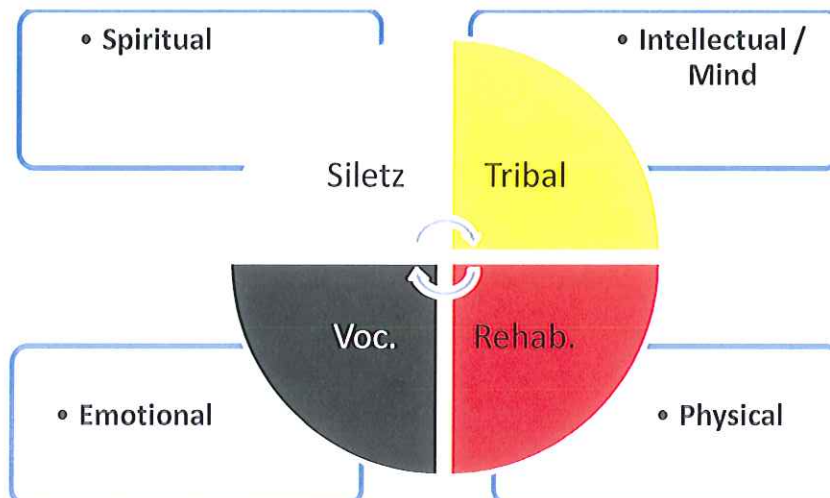

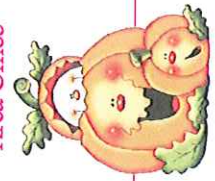
