Fall 2018 applications for <u>new and continuing</u> Higher Ed and AVT students will be due <u>JUNE 30, 2018</u> but to be eligible for funding you must complete a Federal Application for Financial Aid (FAFSA) by <u>January 31, 2018</u>. **DO NOT MISS THIS IMPORTANT DEADLINE!**

If you have any questions about filing out a FAFSA, signing up for the SAT/ACT, finding/applying to schools or training programs, additional scholarships, and/or how to apply for tribal assistance make an appointment today.

Prospective students of all ages are also welcome to attend upcoming college info nights: January 8 4:30-6:30 pm and January 25 4:30-6:30 pm at the Eugene Area Office (see the announcement in "Youth News and Notes" for details).

Note: Applications for clock-hour schools (i.e. truck driving school or cosmetology programs) have no deadline and are handled on a case-by-case basis.

2018 College Students Summer Internship Program New Deadline!

The deadline to apply for the Tribe's 2018 College Students Summer Internship Program has been moved up to March 16, 2018. Selecting students earlier will allow more time to develop relevant work site placements so students can start internships in late June or early July.

To be eligible you must be at least a half-time student attending a two-year or four-year college and in good academic standing.

Applications will be mailed to known students, but if you do not receive an application, please contact Assistant General Manager Bonnie Petersen or the Education Specialists at any tribal Area Office to request an application.

This program assists tribal students with locating internship placements to gain work experience in their field of study. There are ten slots available for 2018. Students may work up to 360 hours at tribal minimum wage and can be placed within or outside of the Tribe. Students selected for the program must complete an orientation, criminal history background check, and drug screening (Note: the Tribe does not recognize Oregon laws allowing the use of medical or recreational marijuana). Placements can begin in June, but must be completed by September 28, 2017.

Naytlh - 'a "We Carry the Children"



Our home visiting program provides parenting and life skills for successful and positive parenting. We serve native families that are either expecting or have infants under the age of twelve months, continuing through the child's third birthday. We travel throughout the 11 county service areas of the Confederated Tribe of Siletz Indians. The model and curriculum we provide is called Family Spirit and was developed by the John Hopkins Center for American Indian Health. We are funded by the Tribal Maternal, Infant, Early Childhood Home Visiting Program (TMIECHV).

Family Spirit is Evidence based and culturally sensitive to native families. Parents gain knowledge and skills for their developing infant through 36 months of age. We also focus on goals and healthy living for parents as a support system for the family as a whole. The program consists of 63 lessons over a 39 month period and is divided into six modules. The modules are broken into these categories: Prenatal care (9 lessons), infant care (16 lessons), your growing child (11 lessons), toddler care (9 lessons), my family and me (6 lessons), and healthy living (12 lessons). While this may seem like a big commitment the lessons vary from 30 minutes to 90 minutes and some can be combined together as we work with your schedule. Family Spirit suggests we deliverer at least 32 lessons to our families in order for families to benefit from the evidence based curriculum. For the full benefits of the program we would like to provide all 63 to our families. As a thank you for participating in our program we offer some incentives which we will be happy to share with you upon the enrolled in our program.

During your participation if you feel like the timeline of lessons is too often we can adjust the home visits to accommodate your schedule while still keeping the programs timeline in mind. We are a voluntary program that delivers home visits in the comfort of the homes of our families. If you would like to get more information and or meet our home visiting staff would love to schedule a home visit to give you a full overview of the program.

Classroom Training (CRT)

CRT services are available for Vocational Training, GED completion, a term of Higher Ed.

Direct Placement

DP is available to any tribal member who has obtained full time employment and applies within seven days of the hire date. Service provides clothing and tools necessary for work.

On-the-Job Training (OJT)

OJT is available to any tribal member seeking employment. It is a reimbursement to an employer for half of a hired employee's wages, up to \$4,500.00 or 6 months, whichever comes first.

Work Experience (WEX)

WEX can be used to obtain current training and skills to be a valued employee. 480 hours paid at minimum wage.

Siletz Tribal Yocational Rehabilitation Program (STYRP)

STVRP is here to help members of <u>ANY</u> federally recognized Tribe (living within the Siletz Tribes service area) with barriers to employment. We work with individuals who have disabilities.



Responsibilities: Peer Support Interventionist staff will provide peer support to parents referred from all Relief Nursery programs. Peer support will consist of, and not be limited to home visits, telephone contacts, transportation, referrals and advocacy. They will work with the Program Supervisor to design and implement education, referral, and involvement in parent components of the program. Peer Support Interventionist will be responsible for set up and clean up of Relief Nursery classes and support groups along with attending group activities to ensure that they are sufficiently supervised and cohesive. They will maintain a personal recovery program, if appropriate, as well as model recovery-appropriate behavior.

- 1) Wet 2) Lather 3) Scrub for at least 20 seconds 4) Rinse 5) Dry
- If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60 percent alcohol.
- Don't touch your eyes, nose and mouth with unclean hands.
- Avoid or limit contact with sick individuals as much as possible.
- Create a cleaning schedule to address high-traffic areas in your house (e.g., Kitchen Sundays, Bedroom Mondays, Bathroom Tuesdays, Wash Wednesdays, etc.), and make it fun!
- Use a bleach solution to clean surfaces such as countertops, sinks, toilets, bathroom floors, and other surfaces. Chlorine bleach is effective in killing stomach viruses such as norovirus. Do not mix bleach and ammonia products together
- Don't forget to clean high-touch areas such as remote controls, light switches, computers/keyboards, door handles, and faucets, etc. Germs can live on surfaces carrying them to the next user.
- Discard all used tissue in the trash, then perform hand hygiene (use soap and water or an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60 percent alcohol).
- If symptoms persist, please see your healthcare provider for further evaluation.

Remember: Getting a flu shot each year is the best way to prevent the flu and to protect those around you. An annual flu vaccine is recommended for everyone 6 months of age and older. An annual vaccine is necessary because flu viruses are constantly changing.

Above all, remember the importance of hand hygiene and its ability to prevent the spread of infections.

Look to the Future: Get an Eye Exam to Save Your Vision from Glaucoma

More than four million people in the United States have glaucoma, a group of diseases that damage the optic nerve and destroy eyesight. Unfortunately, nearly half of those with glaucoma are even aware that they have it. Are you one of them? You owe it to yourself to find out by getting a comprehensive dilated eye exam that includes having drops put in your eye. With its painless and gradual loss of vision, glaucoma may have no early warning signs, but it can be detected during a comprehensive dilated eye exam.

The National Eye Institute research has shown that treatment during the early stages of glaucoma can control the disease and prevent future vision loss and blindness. This is why NEI encourages people at higher risk for glaucoma to get a comprehensive dilated eye exam every one or two years.

Anyone can develop glaucoma, but those at higher risk include:

- African Americans over age 40
- Everyone over age 60
- People with a family history of the disease



During a comprehensive dilated eye exam, an eye care professional can see inside the eye to detect signs of glaucoma, such as subtle changes to the optic nerve, before any symptoms appear. This allows the eye care professional to determine if you have glaucoma or are at risk for it, to monitor your condition, to treat glaucoma as early as possible, and to look for other vision problems. Once symptoms appear, it may be too late to prevent vision loss and the progression to blindness.

If glaucoma is detected early, treatments such as eye drops or surgery can slow or stop vision loss. High pressures inside the eye, which may be associated with glaucoma, does not by itself mean that you have glaucoma. Only a comprehensive dilated eye exam and evaluation of the optic nerve by an eye care professional can tell you that.

I have always wanted to try to make lumpia, but was a little hesitant, just because my husband doesn't like cabbage. I decided to try my own version, using the products available in the food package. They turned out great. Try it for yourself and make adjustments to the recipe according to what you and your family like.

COMMODS LUMPIA

INGREDIENTS:

1 Tablespoon vegetable oil*	1 teaspoon ground black pepper
1 can beef with fat removed*	1 teaspoon salt
2 cloves crushed garlic	1 teaspoon garlic powder
½ cup chopped onion*	1 teaspoon soy sauce
½ cup minced carrots*	1 package ww tortillas*
½ cup thinly sliced cabbage*	2 cups vegetable oil for frying*

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Place a wok or large skillet over high heat and pour in 1 tablespoon vegetable oil. Cook garlic and onion for 2 minutes then add the beef, carrots, and cabbage. Season with pepper, salt, garlic powder and soy sauce. Remove from heat and set aside until cool enough to handle.
- 2. Place 3 heaping tablespoons of the filling on the tortilla leaving a 1½ inch space at both sides. Fold the sides in and roll tightly and moisten the top edge with water to seal the edge.
- **3.** Heat the skillet over medium heat, add oil to ½ inch depth and heat for 5 minutes. Slide 3 or 4 of the rolls into the oil. Fry the rolls for 1 to 2 minutes until all sides are golden brown. Drain on paper towels & serve.
