2018 College Students Summer Internship Program New Deadline!

The deadline to apply for the Tribe's 2018 College Students Summer Internship Program has been moved up to March 16, 2018. Selecting students earlier will allow more time to develop relevant work site placements so students can start internships in late June or early July.

To be eligible you must be at least a half-time student attending a two-year or four-year college and in good academic standing.

Applications will be mailed to known students, but if you do not receive an application, please contact Assistant General Manager Bonnie Petersen or the Education Specialists at any tribal Area Office to request an application.

This program assists tribal students with locating internship placements to gain work experience in their field of study. There are ten slots available for 2018. Students may work up to 360 hours at tribal minimum wage and can be placed within or outside of the Tribe. Students selected for the program must complete an orientation, criminal history background check, and drug screening (Note: the Tribe does not recognize Oregon laws allowing the use of medical or recreational marijuana). Placements can begin in June, but must be completed by September 28, 2017.

I've always wanted to try to make lumpia but was hesitant, just because my husband doesn't like cabbage. I decided to try my own version, using the products available in the food package. They turned out great. Try it for yourself and make adjustments to the recipe according to what you and your family like.



Commods Lumpia

1 tblsp vegetable oil*1 tsp black pepper1 tsp garlic powder1 can beef w/fat removed*1 tsp salt2 cloves crushed garlic½ c. chopped onion*1 tsp soy sauce½ c. minced carrots1 pkg ww tortillas*½ c. thinly sliced cabbage2 c. vegetable oil for frying*

Place a wok or large skillet over high heat and pour in 1 tblsp oil. Cook garlic and onion for 2 minutes then add beef, carrots and cabbage. Season with salt, pepper, garlic powder and soy sauce. Remove from heat and set aside until cool enough to handle.

Place 3 heaping tblsp of the filling on the tortilla leaving a 1 ½ inch space at both sides. Fold the sides in and roll tightly and moisten the top edge with water to seal the edge.

Heat the skillet over medium heat, add oil to ½ inch depth and heat for 5 minutes. Slide 3 or 4 of the rolls into the oil. Fry the rolls for 1-2 minutes until all sides are golden brown. Drain on paper towels and serve.



Funded orthodontic treatment screenings set for 2018

The 2018 Funded Orthodontic Treatment Program is fast approaching! All interested parties should contact the dental department to be placed on a list.

The screening dates are April 16-17 and May 16-17, 2018. The program and amount of accepted applicants will be dependent on the funding for that year.

Applicants are selected by case severity motivation of the patient and guardian, reliable transportation, routine dental checkups and the oral hygiene history of the patient, to name a few. We want the best results possible for the patient and



thus place emphasis on these items in order to achieve it.

The unbiased selection process is performed under the guidance of an orthodontic specialist and participants are chosen through a committee. This is open to all ages who are CHSeligible only. You must have a scheduled screening appointment during one of the four screening days to be considered.

Each year's selection process is independent from previous years and does not carry over. Selected and treated individuals can only be selected once for the duration of the program. All applicants will be notified by mail if they have been chosen.

Glaucoma Awareness Month





Glaucoma is a leading cause of vision loss and blindness in the United States. People are often unaware that glaucoma has no symptoms in its early stages.

If detected early, before noticeable vision loss occurs, glaucoma can usually be controlled and severe vision loss can often be prevented. Vision that is lost from glaucoma cannot be restored.

Anyone can get glaucoma, but those at higher risk include:

- African Americans over age 40
- · Everyone over age 60, especially Hispanics/Latinos
- · People with a family history of the disease

What is glaucoma?



Glaucoma is a group of diseases that can damage the eye's optic nerve and result in vision loss and blindness. The most common form is primary open-angle glaucoma, which is one of the main causes of blindness in the United States.

How does glaucoma cause vision loss?

With glaucoma, the fluid within the eye drains too slowly, and, as the fluid builds up, the pressure inside the eye rises to a level that may damage the optic nerve. When the optic nerve is damaged, peripheral (or side) vision is affected, narrowing the field of vision. Left untreated, total vision loss can occur.


What are the symptoms?

In the early stages of primary open-angle glaucoma, there are no symptoms. However, only 8 percent of people in the United States are aware of this fact. It's important for people to know that glaucoma can be detected early before noticeable vision loss occurs, and that vision that is lost cannot be restored. Although glaucoma cannot be cured, it can usually be controlled.

Vision loss can be prevented or minimized with early detection, treatment, and appropriate follow-up.

What are the numbers?

Almost 3 million people ages 40 and older have glaucoma, yet only half know they have it. Even more alarming is that the number of people with glaucoma is projected to increase in the next few decades to more than 4 million by 2030 and more than 6 million by 2050.

HIGHER EDUCATION/ADULT VOCATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM

The deadline to apply for 2017/2018 year was June 30, 2017. The next deadline to apply is June 31, 2018. It is a requirement that you complete your FAFSA by January 31, 2018 to be eligible to receive tribal assistance.

The applications for FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) opened on October 1, 2017. The Tribal deadline to complete your FAFSA will remain January 31st, but please turn in your application early. Federal money is on a first come first serve basis and given out until gone. Without completing your FAFSA by the January 31 deadline, you will be ineligible to apply for Tribal Higher Education funding for fall.

College Night

High School Seniors

Students that are planning to attend college in the fall of 2018, should be actively preparing by:

- Collecting letters of recommendations-(you will need these when applying for scholarships);
- Taking SAT/ACT test;
- Have parents do their taxes as soon as possible after the end of the year-you will need their tax
 information to fill out the FAFSA (financial aid application) you can use prior year income
 information to complete the FAFSA,
- Talking to your high school counselors about college choices.

Students that plan for college throughout their senior year are better prepared for when they graduate and transition on to college.

Oregon Promise Helps Pay for Community College

The Oregon Promise program—offers new high school graduates and GED recipients an opportunity to have some or all of their community college tuition covered. Grants are for students entering a community college in Oregon in Fall 2018.

You may qualify if you:

- Graduate from an Oregon high school or complete the GED in Spring/Summer 2018
- Have a 2.5 cumulative GPA or higher
- Have been an Oregon resident for at least 12 months prior to enrolling in community college

Steps to take:

- Apply for the Oregon Promise between November 1, 2017 and March 1, 2018, including:
- Complete the Oregon Promise application (online or written)
- Submit your high school transcript or GED scores
- Complete the FAFSA or its approved alternative

Once approved, enroll in an Oregon community college within six months of graduating high school or completing the GED (Fall 2018)— and accept all state and federal grants

FOR ALL STUDENTS CONTEMPLATING ATTENDING SCHOOL FALL TERM (including High School Seniors, returning students and anyone that may be interested in attending school Fall Term 2018):

FAFSA- Free Application for Federal Student Aid

It is a tribal program requirement that you fill out the application for federal student aid (FAFSA) by January 31, 2018, to receive tribal funding for Fall 2018. There is no exception to this requirement.

FAQ's

Is there a cost to fill out the FAFSA application? No, there is never a fee, as the name states it is a Free application. If you are on a site that says there is a fee, it is the wrong site. The site is www.fafsa.ed.gov

I don't have my taxes complete yet, what do I do? You do not have to wait until you complete your 2017 taxes, you can use the tax information from 2016 and list on the application that it is last year's income and you will update your FAFSA once you complete your taxes.

What do I do if I miss the January 31, FAFSA deadline? Unfortunately it is a Tribal requirement, so you would have to wait until the next school year to apply.

I do not plan on attending school Fall term but want to go Winter Term, when would I apply? There are two deadlines that you must meet, the January 31, FAFSA deadline and the June 30, Tribal Education application deadline. On the application you would indicate Winter and Spring Terms only.

The applications became available on October 31, 2017. Applications are available on-line at www.fafsa.ed.gov.


ADULT EDUCATION



Adult Children of Alcoholics Behaviors and Characteristic

This is some of the signs that happen to us when someone we love or care for is chemically dependent. It may happen slowly and gradually. We loved or enjoyed our relationship with that special someone for a long time but something changed in our loved one. They started drinking or using drugs or maybe it was always that way and we just begun to see it. We then began to compensate pretended nothing was wrong and accepted some of our loved ones traits. But when that happens pretty soon our own behaviors begin to change. Here are some characteristics of the ACOA person.

- 1. I need to be in control of people and situation or I just don't feel comfortable.
- 2. I have trouble fitting in. I feel like a outsider, whether I am in my community or not.
- 3. I don't know how to have fun. I'm very serious all the time and life isn't enjoyable.
- 4. I'm overly responsible about everything except when I'm irresponsible. There's no happy medium for me.
- 5. I have trouble with intimacy and relationships because I'm afraid of rejection or abandonment.
- 6. Life is a ongoing crisis. When its not in crisis I wonder what will go on next.
- 7. I have difficult following through projects from beginning to end.
- 8. I constantly seek approval and affirmation from others.
- 9. I lie when it would be easier to tell the truth.
- 10. I am extremely loyal, even when it isn't deserved or there is proof otherwise.

Addiction is a family disease and with all members of the home just like the addict we need to work on ourselves as well. We learn dysfunctional behaviors because we live in uncertainty with our loved one who is addicted. ACOA meetings are a great place to start our own healing journey.
