Each month we will spotlight a particular style of powwow dance.



Grass Dance

According to traditional stories, a young crippled boy was called to go out onto the prairie and find guidance and direction. As he walked about he noticed the swaying motion of the grass and the bend of the stocks. He mimicked these movements in a vision of which he demonstrated to his people. He regained the use of his legs, thus the Grass Dance was born. The idea behind this dance is like the story told, to mimic the movements of grass. By patting one's foot and then repeating the motion with the other, the dancer can smooth the ground to bend and fold while his regalia flows in motion like the Grass of which it was inspired.

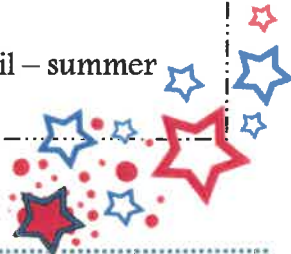

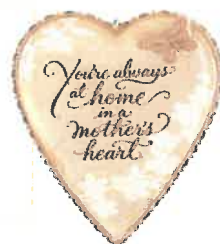
CONGRATULATIONS!

White Beans and Ham

2 lbs Dry Great Northern Beans*

1 celery stalk, diced*

1 lb diced ham*

1 bag baby carrots, diced*

3 small onions, diced*

red pepper flakes, S/P

Soak the beans in salted water overnight in enough water to cover, + 3". Drain and rinse the beans. Fill with water again. Cook beans until tender.

While beans are cooking, dice the onion, carrot and celery. Saute veggies in a little butter with salt until they get soft. Add the veggies to the beans.

Dice the ham chunks and add to the beans.

Melanoma/Skin Cancer Detection and Prevention Month

Skin cancer is the most common type of cancer in the United States. Ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun is the main cause of skin cancer. UV damage can also cause wrinkles and blotches or spots on your skin. The good news is that skin cancer can be prevented, and it can almost always be cured when it's found and treated early.

Siletz Community Health Department is proud to participate in Melanoma/Skin Cancer Detection and Prevention Month. During the month of May, join us in taking action to prevent skin cancer and reduce the risk of UV damage.

Take simple steps today to protect your skin:

- Stay out of the sun as much as possible between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
- Use sunscreen with SPF 15 or higher. Put on sunscreen every 2 hours and after you swim or sweat.
- Cover up with long sleeves and a hat.
- Check your skin regularly for changes.

Make an appointment with your health provider immediately if you discover any spots or have other skin condition concerns.

No Bake Energy Bites

Ingredients:

1/2 Cup Peanut Butter
1/3 Cup Honey or agave syrup
1 tsp Vanilla extract
1 Cup Old fashioned oats (raw)
2/3 cup toasted, sweetened coconut
1/2 cup ground flaxseed
6 TBSP Mini chocolate chips

Directions

In a mixing bowl, stir together peanut butter, honey and vanilla extract. Add remaining ingredients and stir until evenly coated. Transfer mixture to refrigerator or freezer and chill until set. Remove from fridge and shape into 1-inch balls. Store in the refrigerator in an air tight container

Are you interested in gaining skills for successful and positive parenting?

Our home visiting program provides parenting and life skills for successful and positive parenting. We serve native families that are either expecting or have infants under the age of twelve months, continuing through the child's third birthday. The model and curriculum we provide is called Family Spirit and was developed by the John Hopkins Center for American Indian Health. Family Spirit is Evidence based and culturally sensitive to native families. Parents gain knowledge and skills for their developing infant through 36 months of age. We also focus on goals and healthy living for parents as a support system for the family as a whole.

The Peer Recovery Mentor assists A/D and Mental Health clients getting service through the Siletz Tribe. Assistance includes, but is not limited to: Meeting individuals where they are at to discover opportunities which may change their lives; working with individuals to identify any barriers to recovery they may have and develop a working plan to overcome these barriers; outreach services obtaining A&D assessment and referrals for medically assisted substance treatment, residential substance treatment, outpatient substance treatment services; act as liaison to other CTSI programs – SSP, Vocational-Rehab, Education, medical and cultural programs; walk with individuals through Legal and DHS providing moral support; assist in locating recovery based housing; attending self-help meetings with individuals and groups; assist in getting a sponsor; and integrating individuals into a positive peer recovery community.

I am available to meet with individuals who are incarcerated and will soon be released.

In Times of Grief:

In face of recent tragedies in the tribe, it is important to remember there are many different ways people grieve, and no right or wrong to those ways. There are, of course, healthy ways of grieving, and ways that are less healthy, such as joining support groups, or turning to drugs or alcohol. Sometimes, an unfortunate side-effect to grieving, is to have a well-meaning person tell you that your method of grieving is in some way wrong. Remember, it is okay to let this person know you appreciate their thoughts, but that you need to focus on what you feel is right at the moment, to recover from your loss.

Here are some aspects of grieving that are natural and completely reasonable:

- 1) Allow yourself to fully experience the pain of your loss. It can be hard to allow pain in, but it is a natural part of the grieving process. It can be detrimental to your health to avoid that pain, and can even cause long-term damage to your mental health. Grief is a part of life. That being said, it is also okay to put your

grief away for a while, especially when it becomes overwhelming.

- 2) Talk with others, particularly people who have experienced a similar type of loss. No one understands how you feel, but people with similar experiences can share how they coped.
- 3) Express your grief through creative processes such as art, dance, music.
- 4) Be sure to keep physically active. It is a hard time to do so, but all the more important to keep mental health struggles such as depression at bay.

Traditional Coping

Remember our tribe's traditional methods of grieving, and your particular family's ways. It may be a time for participating in a sweat, a wake, or a time to gather and share memories while sharing a meal. There may be talking circles, dancing, praying. As ever, it is a good time to reach out to an Elder and/or the Creator.

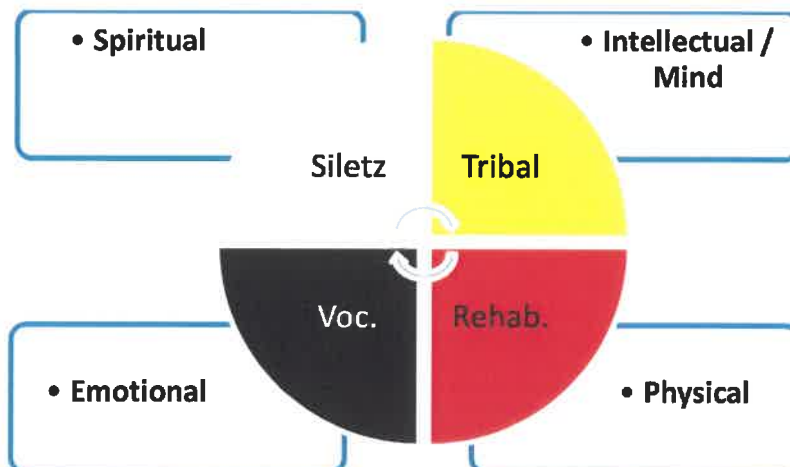
