This program serves CTSI tribal members looking to avoid foreclosure, facing eviction and those that are homeless, anywhere in the United States of America. There is no waiting list for this program. Funds will be available once funds are received each fiscal year and will be offered based on a first-come, first-served basis. The Siletz Community Health Clinic will be offering Medication Assistance Treatment (MAT) in Salem, Oregon soon. The clinic is contracting with a local provider, Eric Davis, MSW, BCD, LCSW, QMHP, MAC, CADC III, and JD Health and Wellness, to offer MAT services. MAT services to be provided include: medication treatment (SUBOXONE®/VIVITROL®/Antabuse), mental health counseling, and A&D counseling.

What is MAT: MAT is the use of medications with counseling and behavioral therapies to treat substance use disorders and prevent opioid overdose. MAT is primarily used for the treatment of addiction to opioids such as heroin and prescription pain relievers that contain opiates. (SAMHSA)

Who is eligible for services at the Salem MAT clinic: Siletz tribal members, other Natives, and non-Native with close family ties. Initially, the program is able to accept 25 patients.

Annual Deadlines for Enrollment

The deadline to submit an Application for Enrollment, name changes, blood quantum correction and requests for relinquishment of Tribal membership is the 2nd Friday in the months of January, April, July and September. The Enrollment Committee reviews the applications and requests at their meetings in the months of February, May, August and October. Tribal Council takes action on the Committee's recommendations in March, June, September and November. There is a blackout period for Enrollment Actions from December 1st to Election Day (1st Saturday in February) annually.

Social Security Cards

Letters were recently sent out for minors who do not have a social security card on file. If you received a letter, please get a COLOR copy mailed directly to Enrollment or take to an Area Office to have a COLOR copied made and sent to our office.

Phone Calls and Email Blasts

Occasionally, Tribal Departments and Area Offices send out "robo calls" to give information to a group of people; Elders or by service area, of events that are occurring such as fish distribution, heat waves, etc. In order to receive the phone calls you must have a current phone number on file with Enrollment. You can also sign up for email notifications that are sent out by emailing angelar@ctsi.nsn.us.

Children NOT Enrolled That Could Be

To be eligible for enrollment with the Tribe an applicant must be:

1. Not enrolled with another Federally recognized Tribe;
2. Be the biological descendent of a Siletz Tribal member;
3. Have a blood quantum of 1/16 or more (*the Siletz parent needs to behave a blood quantum that is equal or more than 1/8, 2/16, 4/32, 8/64, 16/128, 32/256*);
4. Submit their original State issued birth certificate; and
5. Submit their original Social Security Card.

The originals are examined by staff, copies made and the originals are returned via certified mail when not brought in to a Tribal office directly.

Within the 11-county service area, the Enrollment Department is aware **of at least 20 children that are not enrolled that could be**. There are likely many more and we would like for Tribal members to get their child's application submitted as soon as possible. When your child is not enrolled with the Siletz Tribe, some of the detriments are:

- Your child CAN receive direct care from the Siletz Clinic and Purchased/Referred Care through the age of 18, however their health care coverage from the Tribe ends on their 19th birthday;
- Your child DOES NOT accumulate funds in a Trust account from annual per capita distributions;
- Your child is NOT ELIGIBLE for JOM (Johnson O'Malley) funds for education and sports fees;
- Your child is not eligible for Siletz Tribal Youth Activity funds that is available to all Tribal Youth regardless of where they reside (\$75.00 per year);
- When your child is an adult they WILL NOT be eligible for Adult Education, Adult Vocational Training (AVT), and Higher Education funding;
- When your child goes to college, they would not be able to apply for Tribal Student Housing Assistance; and
- There are many other benefits to being a Siletz Tribal member they would be unable to receive.

Mailing Address Updates For Per Capita Checks

The last day to get your mailing address updated in time to not cause a delay in the mailing of your per capita check is Friday, July 12, 2019 by the end of the business day. Any address changes after that date will affect the mailing of the per capita check, causing a delay in receiving it. Please see the information below about address changes and missing moccasins. For the full policy regarding per capita checks, please see the Tribal Member Distribution Ordinance on the Tribal website www.ctsi.nsn.us under Government Listings > Tribal Ordinances.

Address Changes

If you have recently moved, even if you have a forwarding address on file with the post office, please get your *Address & Contact Information Update* form in as soon as possible. You can get the form on the Tribal website, from any Tribal office or contact the Enrollment Department to have one mailed to you. All address updates must be in writing to ensure that you have requested the address to be changed, this is for your own security.

As a note, "General Delivery" is NOT acceptable as a mailing address as it is only temporary and the Post Office will only hold the mail for a limited time for delivery. We had a large amount of "General Delivery" mail returned and this is not effective in getting mail to Tribal members when we need to. It is much better to rent a Post Office box if you are not able to use a permanent address somewhere else. If this is a concern for you or someone on the Missing Moccasin list, call 1.800.922.1399 ext. 1258 and we will work with them to figure out a permanent address solution.

Help Us Find The Missing Moccasins!

If someone does not have a good address and phone number on file with Enrollment, considered a "Missing Moccasin." Please check the list on the Tribal website for might know. Missing Moccasins do not receive their per capita check on time! In Missing Moccasins do not receive this newsletter, election mail, 1099 forms and other mail from the Tribe. How Much is Per Capita Going To Be?

The amount for the per capita payment is calculated on July 1st taking in to account the amount to be distributed, the number of enrolled Tribal members alive on that day, and postage costs. On Monday, July 1st after 12:00 PM you will be able to call (541) 444-8224 to hear an automated recording of the amount as well as going to the Tribal website, under the opening page of the member area login for the written announcement.

Where Is My Per Capita Check?

Per Capita checks are going to be mailed on Monday, July 31st to the address on file with the Enrollment Department as of July 15, 2019 unless an address update is submitted.

- The Tribal Member Distribution Ordinance requires distribution of checks to be initially MAILED; therefore it CAN NOT be picked up at the Siletz Tribal Office. Per checks are NOT able to be direct deposited.
- Mail from Siletz takes as long as four days to get to address in Portland, Salem and Eugene. Please allow "snail mail" time before calling to see where your per check is.
- If you are a "Missing Moccasin" as of Friday, July 12th your check will be held until an updated address is submitted. If you are a "Missing Moccasin" and update your address between Monday, July 15th and Wednesday, July 31st the per capita check will be MAILED ON Thursday, August 1, 2019. All other "Missing Moccasins" that update their address after August 1, 2019 will have their checks mailed when the address update is received.
- The adult "Missing Moccasin" list is now on the Tribal website on the Enrollment page under Government Listing. Please check there to see if you or anyone you know is listed.
- Policy states you must wait 15 business days (in the case of per capita checks until 8/22/2019) from the time of mailing before you can submit a request for a "stop payment" to Accounting and have the check re-issued. This allows time for the check to be returned if it is "undeliverable" to the address it was mailed to.
- If your check is returned as "undeliverable" you must submit an address update to Enrollment in order to have your check re-mailed.

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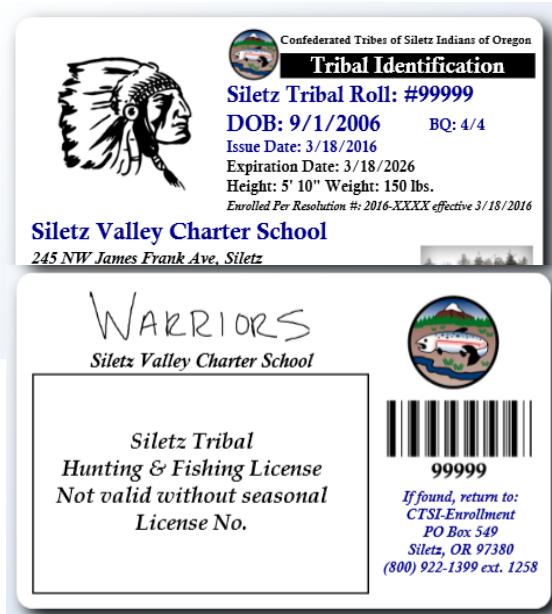
Do you have a Tribal ID Card?

You can obtain your Siletz Tribal ID three ways! This is for adults and children, make plans to get yours today if you do not have one.

1. Come to the Siletz Administration between 8:00 AM and 4:30 PM to get your Tribal ID in person the same day. If you are planning to travel to Siletz, you should call ahead to make sure that the ID machine is at the office, as occasionally it is taken to a Tribal event to issue ID cards at the event.
2. Contact your local Area Office in Eugene, Salem or Portland to make sure that the staff member is available for when you plan to go to the office. Have some other form of ID with you so they can confirm your identity. They will take your photo and capture your digital signature. These will be sent to the Enrollment office in Siletz. Your ID card will be printed in Siletz and mailed to you via Priority® Mail. You will receive your ID card in a couple days.
3. If you are unable to go to a Tribal office, there is a form on the Tribal website to request your Tribal ID. You will need to have someone take your photo with a digital camera or smart phone; additional instructions are on the form. Your signature will need to be notarized and a copy of another form of ID mailed so we can confirm the photo emailed to us is you. The card will be sent to you via Priority® Mail and you will have your card in a couple of days.

The good thing is that with this updated system and technology, should you lose your card or move and need an card with your new address, just call us and we can mail it to There is a \$5.00 fee for a *replacement* ID card. Every Tribal is able to have one Tribal ID per calendar year at no charge. If to update your Tribal ID for a name change, new address, or updated photo the Tribal ID is not considered a replacement there is no fee. Having a reprint of the same card that was previously issued within the same calendar year is considered replacement card that would require the \$5.00 fee to be paid. take in to consideration catastrophic events for loss of a Tribal waive the replacement fee.

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A \$7,000 Tribal benefit Do you know what it is? Will your loved one benefit from it?

Obviously, none of us wants to think about passing away and our funeral. Inevitably, it will happen...to all of us. We should do our best to make sure we have arranged what we can. One simple thing you can do, submit your Designation of Death Benefit Beneficiary form to the Enrollment Department.

The Siletz Tribe self-funds (Tribal funds) a Death Benefit to all enrolled Tribal members, including children, for funeral and burial costs. **As of 5/02/2019 there are 1,470 Tribal members that have no beneficiary listed for this benefit.** Are you, a family member or your children one of them?

A mail out was done in March 2019 to Tribal members with no beneficiary on file and to those with forms on file that were last submitted 10 years or more in case information needs to be updated. Please check with your family members

to see if they have submitted their paperwork for this important benefit. If you know you have one on file, when was the last time the contact information for the beneficiary was updated if the beneficiary is not a Tribal member. Do you know whom you have listed as your beneficiary? Does your beneficiary know you named them? There is a brochure on the Tribal website that is beneficial for the beneficiary to have.

Things Tribal members need to know about Death Benefits:

- When an unenrolled child, six months or younger, passes away, and is eligible for enrollment, but not yet enrolled at the time of death, the child will be eligible for the Death Benefit. This includes miscarriages and stillborn children when the family chooses to have a funeral service. The Enrollment Department will administer the Death Benefit to pay for funeral expenses only.
- Tribal members need to fill out and keep a copy of the Designation of Death Benefit Beneficiary form. The form can be updated at ANY time to name a different beneficiary or to update the contact information for your beneficiary. It is extremely important to update your Death Benefit Beneficiary Designation form anytime you marry, divorce, or if your designated person passes away.
- The designated beneficiary needs to be age 18 and older as they may be the one responsible for making your funeral arrangements.
- Are your children over the age of 18 now? They need to update their beneficiary. You can now update your beneficiary to include them.
- The Enrollment Department keeps the original form on file with the Tribal member's Enrollment file. In the event of your passing, the most recent form that has been submitted is what will be used to determine the Beneficiary for this benefit.
- The beneficiary can be anyone. A Tribal member or a non-Tribal member. They can be a family member or not. The most common beneficiary is a parent, spouse, adult children, or someone trusted who will be in charge of making your funeral arrangements.
- The current Death Benefit amount is \$6,000 and is for burial and funeral expenses. Most funeral homes are willing to work with the Tribe so families do not have to pay out-of-pocket costs up to the benefit amount. Some funeral homes are not, so please be aware of that.
- If the funeral expenses are less than \$6,000, then the unused balance of the Death Benefit goes directly to the beneficiary.
- If the funeral expenses are over \$6,000, the balance of the expenses is the responsibility of the person making the funeral arrangements.
- The current amount that goes directly to the beneficiary that is not part of the burial expenses is \$1,000 and will be paid directly to the beneficiary.
- If there is no beneficiary listed, the funeral and burial expenses are still paid and the Enrollment Department will work with the family and the funeral home. However, any unused balance of the Death Benefit and the \$1,000 will go unpaid to anyone.
- The Tribe has caskets, standard size and "2x", on hand that have a Pendleton blanket liner that can be purchased with death benefits or directly.
- If you have specific wishes for your burial, please let your family members know this. You may also want to research costs for plots and fees if you wish to be buried someplace other than at the Siletz cemetery.
- There is a form to use as a tool in planning your funeral service if you want to provide your family guidance. It can be found on the Enrollment section of the Tribal website on the "Death Benefits" tab.

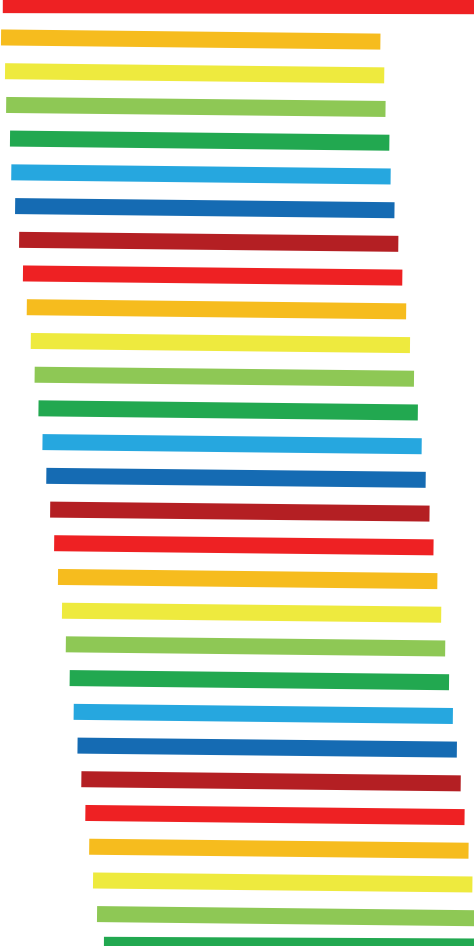

There, however, have been a few minor changes made to the program under the new funding source. The two areas that you will notice changes in are ELIGIBILITY and INCENTIVES.

ELIGIBILITY

The Siletz Tribal Home Visiting program will now be following new eligibility guidelines. To be eligible for the program, families must meet the criteria below:

- Siletz Tribal Head of household or dependent child;
- Family must be considered “at risk” and these factors include:
 - Income below 300% federal poverty level for last 30 days
 - Households that reside in rural locations that have limited employment opportunities
 - First time parent
 - Households with at least one adult without a post-secondary certificate
 - Family experienced trauma, chemical dependency or mental health barriers

Note – Effective January 1, 2019, these guidelines pertain to all newly enrolled families.

INCENTIVES

Effective January 2019, families will no longer receive incentives in the form of gift cards for their participation in the home visiting program. Families will receive incentives in the form of a point system for attending home visits and family activity nights. You then use the points to “buy an item”. This will be evaluated after six months to assure the program can continue sustaining the new incentive system dependent on funding.

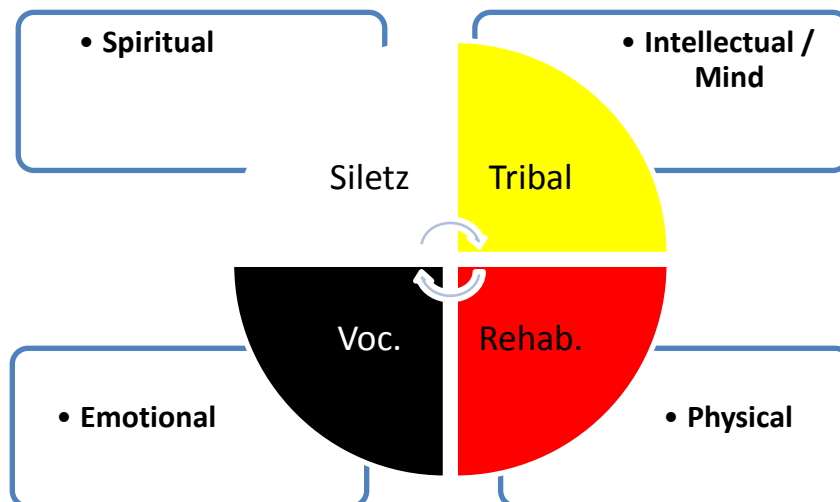

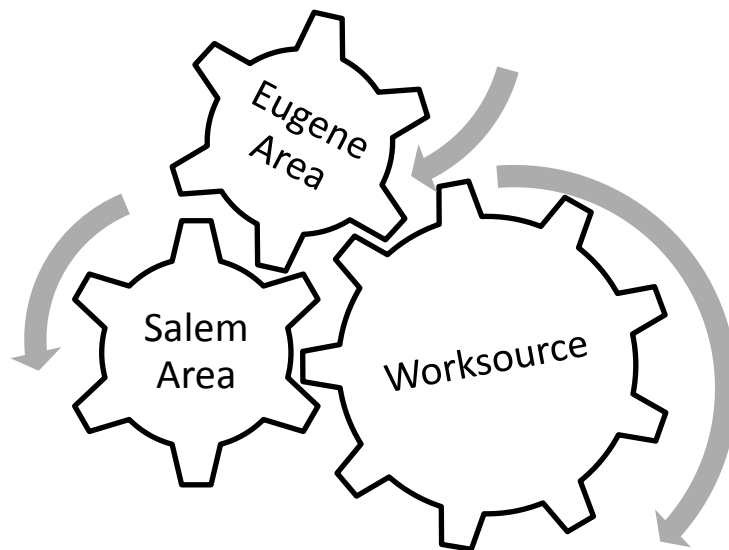

Classroom Training (CRT)

CRT services are available for Vocational Training, GED completion, a term of Higher Ed.

Direct Placement

DP is available to any tribal member who has obtained full time employment and applies within seven days of the hire date. Service provides clothing and tools necessary for work.

On-the-Job Training (OJT)

OJT is available to any tribal member seeking employment. It is a reimbursement to an employer for half of a hired employee's wages, up to \$4,500.00 or 6 months, whichever comes first.

Work Experience (WEX)

WEX can be used to obtain current training and skills to be a valued employee. 480 hours paid at minimum wage.



Purchased Referred Care (PRC) (formerly Contract Health Service)

You can get help with your medical bills if you participate in PRC.

PRC can pay your copays and patient responsibility if you follow these easy steps.

- 1) Complete an annual update form and turn into PRC.
- 2) If you do not have any health insurance, you are required to sign up for no cost health care or provide over income verification. You can call our Benefits Coordinator @ 541-444-9611 for assistance.
- 3) You are required to contact PRC within 24 hours of any Dental, Optometry, Medical: office visit, labs, radiology, etc... appointments to get an authorization number.
- 4) Take your insurance cards and your authorization number to your appointments. Each appointment requires a different authorization number.

Alternate Healthcare benefits

Alternate Healthcare benefits are available to all enrolled Siletz Tribal members. Dependents and descendants are not eligible for alternate healthcare benefits. We do request that you have completed an individual registration application and are updated with the Siletz Community Health Clinic before obtaining authorization for Alternate healthcare benefits.

The benefits that are available are acupuncture, chiropractic care, and massage therapy. These benefits are available 4 times per year at the beginning of each quarter as long as funding is available. It is on a 1st come 1st serve basis. A tribal member just needs to contact PRC and request which benefit they would like. The patient will then receive a letter that lets them know what they are eligible for, how many visits, and the benefit \$ amount. The letter also provides information that they can give to their provider, so they are aware of the payment process. Each patient is eligible for a maximum of 3 visits up to \$50.00 per visit per day per quarter. Anything over that becomes patient responsibility.

CAREMARK (PEQUOT) PHARMACY CARD & REIMBURSEMENT INFORMATION

Regardless of where you live, your pharmacy benefit is \$500.00 per year. Every January 1st your card renews. Members that live in the 11-County Service Area should have your maintenance medication mailed to you through the Siletz Community Health Clinic (SCHC) pharmacy. Not all medications are in the SCHC formulary, so that is when you would use your pharmacy card at a retail pharmacy such as Walgreens, Fred Meyer, Rite Aid etc.

Members that live outside the 11-County Service Area (Direct Care) are not able to get medication mailed through the Siletz clinic, but are able to get medication directly through Pequot Pharmacy. Any maintenance medication needed by Direct Care patients should be mailed to Pequot directly this will stretch your card dollars.

Patients that have primary pharmacy insurance, such as: Medicaid, Blue Cross Blue Shield, AETNA, Medicare Part D etc . . . and have to pay a co-pay up front to the retail pharmacy, can be reimbursed up to the \$500.00 per year. Members that pay up front for medication, and still have a balance on their pharmacy card, can be reimbursed as well.

To receive a reimbursement you must provide the receipt from the pharmacy, **NOT** the cash register receipt. The receipt must have: **YOUR NAME, DOCTORS NAME, DATE OF SERVICE, MEDICATION NAME, MEDICATION DOSAGE, AMOUNT PAID.** Mail your receipt to Purchased Referred Care, PO Box 320, Siletz, OR 97380.

Your pharmacy card should **NOT** have your social security # on it. If the card has your social security # on it, you need to contact Rhonda Attridge with PRC @ 1-800-628-5720 to get a new card. You will be required to have an updated Individual Registration form on file in order to receive your new card.

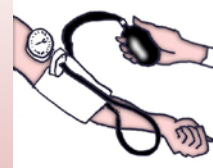

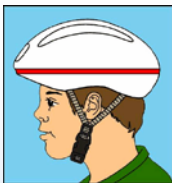

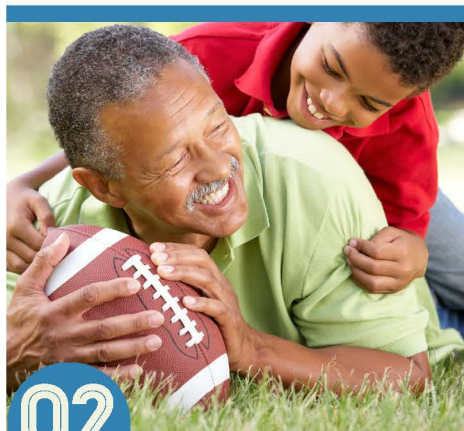

June is Home Safety Month

The weather is warming up and the last thing you want to do is spend the summer in a cast, or worse yet, in the hospital or dead.

Injuries are a major source of childhood emergency room and hospital admissions. According to the National Safety Council and the National Center for Injury Prevention and Control:

- Injury is the leading cause of death in children and young adults.
- Falls are the leading cause of unintentional injury for children.
- According to *Injury Facts*, in 2012, an estimated 89,000 unintentional-injury related deaths occurred in the home and community.
- Drowning is the second leading cause of unintentional injury-related death among children ages one to 14. The majority of drowning, and near-drowning, occur in residential swimming pools and in open water sites. However, children can drown in as little as one inch of water.
- Airway obstruction injury is the leading cause of unintentional injury-related death among infants under age one.
- Approximately 45 percent of unintentional injury deaths occurred in and around the home. Unintentional home injury deaths to children are caused primarily by fire and burns, suffocation, drowning, firearms, falls, choking and poisoning.



There are many steps that you can take to ensure the safety of your home and family:

- Learn CPR and make sure your babysitter has been trained. Call your local Red Cross or American Heart Association for class information
- Keep this number posted: **Oregon Poison Control 1-800-222-1222**
- Install childproof door locks and keep medications and potentially poisonous materials out of reach of children.
- Inspect your house for loose carpets, extension cords and other fall hazards for your safety as well as the safety of visitors, such as grandparents, who may be at risk for falls.
- Require that your child wear a bicycle helmet every time they ride a bike, skateboard, skates or scooter.
- Keep small objects away from infants and toddlers.
- Use appropriate car seats for children.
- Keep firearms locked and un-accessible to children.
- Never leave small children unattended in pools or bathtubs.
- Know the **Heimlich maneuver** and the universal sign of choking.

Health Benefits of Quitting Smoking

- **20 Minutes after quitting**—Your heart rate drops. (CDC)
- **12 hours after quitting**—Carbon monoxide levels in your blood drops to normal. (CDC)

- **2 weeks to 3 months after quitting**—Your heart attack risk begins to drop. Your lung function begins to improve. (CDC)

- **1 year after quitting**—Your added risk of coronary heart disease is half that of a smoker. (CDC)
- **5 years after quitting**—Your stroke risk is reduced to that of a nonsmoker, 5-15 years after quitting. (CDC)
- **10 years after quitting**—Your lung cancer death rate is about half that of a smokers. Your risk of cancers of the mouth, throat, esophagus, bladder, kidney, and pancreas decreases. (CDC)
- **15 years after quitting**—Your risk of coronary heart disease is back to that of a nonsmoker. (CDC)

Portland Street Art Alliance Receives Oregon Community Foundation Creative Heights Grant to Seed a Mural District in the Central Eastside

Portland Street Art Alliance launches new district-wide arts initiative to promote inclusive engagement and access to public art-making in the city.

March 3, 2019 (Portland, OR) - The Portland Street Art Alliance secured a competitive Oregon Community Foundation (OCF) Creative Heights grant to seed a new mural arts district in Portland's Central Eastside Industrial District (CEID). For the fifth consecutive year, Creative Heights has funded innovative and impactful projects that take artist and arts organizations to new heights.

Founded in 2012 as a 501(c)(3) non-profit, the *Portland Street Art Alliance (PSAA)* has managed over 40 commissioned and publicly funded projects across Portland. PSAA builds a community of street artists, documents the history of Portland street art, and advocates for artists and for greater inclusion and equity among art programs. PSAA's mission is to cultivate a more democratic culture of artistic expression by activating public spaces and broadening perspectives to build a more engaged and diverse city.

The *Central Eastside Industrial District* (CEID) is a historic and unique industrial sanctuary. It has been a hub of exchange for over a century – home to the manufacturers, merchants, and makers who built, fed and creatively engaged this city for over 150 years. This is all quickly changing - old warehouses are being renovated or torn down, and new developments going up. As a result, CEID is losing many of its historically accessible spaces for artists and grassroots creatives.

The goal of **Viaduct Arts** is to promote more inclusive engagement and access to public art-making.

This new district-wide **Viaduct Arts** initiative will begin by painting murals along the 5-block section beneath the Morrison Bridge viaduct in Summer 2019, expanding to beneath the Hawthorne Bridge and along SE 2nd and 3rd Avenues in future years.

Viaduct Arts will not only contribute to the overall vibrancy of CEID, but also to the creative capital in all of Oregon by including and compensating artists from every corner of the state with a focus on those who are underserved. Central to the success of this project is providing and preserving equitable access for artists across Oregon to push their creative limits and make their voices heard in urban public spaces. The grant provides funding for ongoing graffiti art production walls as well as mentorship opportunities for Oregon-based artists from underrepresented communities (BIPOC+, LGBTQ, Women, Disabled, Low SES, Tribal, Farmworker, etc.). The OCF grant provides funding to support artists for their time and supplies, and for visiting artists, their travel and lodging as well.

A statewide open call to artists will be announced in spring 2019.

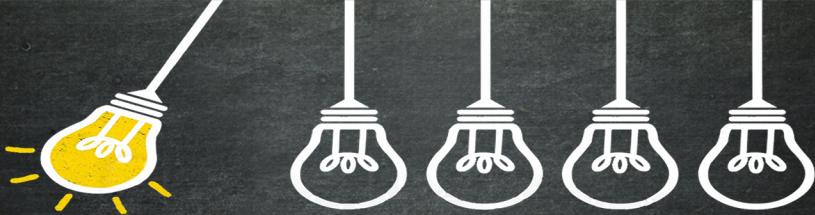

If you fit either category, please call the Natural Resources Department (Denise Garrett at 541-444-8227 or Mike Kennedy at 541-444-8232). We will then pair up volunteer firewood cutters and elders in need. Please note, this is a volunteer activity. No one will be paid to perform this service and elders should not be charged anything to receive firewood. A tribal firewood permit is required and would be issued by Natural Resources.
