Addictions are treatable and staff is personally dedicated to providing culturally relevant treatment services.

- Cultural/traditional Individual, group, or family counseling
- Adolescent treatment
- Women's specific treatment
- Intervention
- Recreational therapy

- Urinalysis/saliva testing

With funding provided by the Siletz Tribal Council, we are able to assist Native Americans (enrolled in a federally recognized tribe or descendant) that reside within the service area, with licensing fees, background checks, testing fees, outdoor work clothing/tools and transportation assistance. 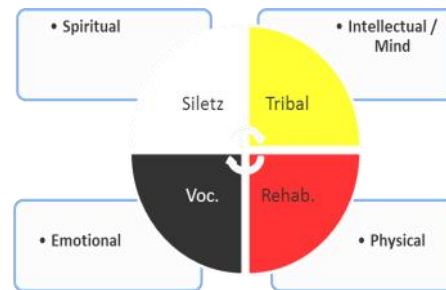

Savvy Caregiver in Indian Country, Training

Savvy Caregiver in Indian Country is a six-week group program for Native People designed to help caregivers provide care and support for someone with Alzheimer's or dementia.

Savvy Caregiver in Indian Country is a culturally-adapted program, developed by Dr. J Neil Henderson, Oklahoma Choctaw, and Executive Director of the Memory Keepers Medical Discovery Team on Health Disparities at the University of Minnesota Medical School.

These free classes offer care strategies, resources, and support to the caregiver. Savvy Caregiver training teaches the caregiver to know the stages of dementia. Knowing the stage allows the caregiver to use activities and tasks that better fit the abilities and capabilities of their loved one resulting in more hours of "contented involvement."

Tobacco Prevention Education Program

Tobacco as Tradition

Traditional Tobacco is: tobacco and/or other plant mixtures grown or harvested and used by American Indians and Alaska Natives for ceremonial or medicinal purposes.

Traditional tobacco has been used by American Indian nations for centuries as a medicine with cultural and spiritual importance. Many Tribes maintain teachings and stories on the origin of tobacco. These teachings address tobacco in its purest form, today known as the tobacco plant *Nicotiana rustica*, and may include mixtures of other native plants. One common teaching involves the importance of having good attitudes and thoughts while working with traditional tobacco. Traditional tobacco is a medicine, which can be used in a prescribed way to promote physical, spiritual, emotional, and community well-being. It may be used as an offering

to the Creator or to another person, place, or being. A gift of traditional tobacco is a sign of respect and may be offered when asking for help, guidance, or protection. Traditional tobacco is sometimes used directly for healing in traditional medicine. It may be burned in a fire or smoked in a pipe, yet the smoke is generally not inhaled.

In many teachings, the smoke from burned tobacco has a purpose of carrying thoughts and prayers to the spirit world or to the Creator. When used appropriately, traditional tobacco is not associated with addiction and adverse health impacts.

Here are a few other examples of how tobacco was/is used for traditional purposes:

For our Hunters, traditional tobacco

would be used when our people would kill an elk or deer or when we would catch a salmon or trout. Tobacco would be placed at the location or close by so we can communicate with the creator and give our thanks and appreciation “thank you for this elk or salmon as we will use it to feed our family”.

For our Gatherers:

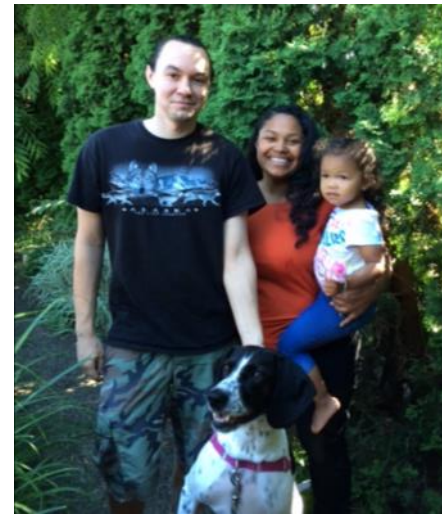
Traditional tobacco would be used when our people would gather supplies so that we may use them to make our baskets, or gather traditional medicines as we use it to heal. Tobacco would be placed at the location or

close by so that we can communicate to the creator and give our thanks and appreciation “thank you creator for these sticks or medicines that we may use them for our baskets or medicines to help us heal”.

Tobacco is a powerful medicine, keep it traditional.

Eleeziaa stayed engaged with the Home Visiting program through moves and job changes participating in lessons and Home Visiting family events. When possible her partner Ryan attended events as well occasion-

ally bringing Annalia when Eleeziaa could not attend.

Eleeziaa is committed to her family and being the best parent she can be. Along with Ryan she continues to learn and grow planning ahead for the future. Eleeziaa works to share her cultural heritage with Annalia, attending Tribal events and learning traditional crafts (moccasins, jewelry, regalia and more).

Eleeziaa had this to say, “I went into this parenting gig not knowing the ins and outs and having the guidance and visits helped a lot in becoming the parent I am now. With the home visiting program we not only got educated on how to be better parents we gained an important figure in our lives, our home visitor. If I had worries she could inform me on things I didn’t know. My daughter knows who my home visitor is because she’s become a huge part in our lives.” When asked if she would recommend the program to other families she said, “Yes, definitely, especially those who have questions or worries.” Congratulations Eleeziaa!
