All of this takes a toll on your financial stability and recovery process because it adds unnecessary stress to you and your recovery program. In addiction we want what we want, when we want it and that makes room for more impulsive behaviors to come up. If you get control of the financial health, chances are you will be able to take control over other things in life and stay on track with your recovery process. Here are some tips on how to start to take control over managing your money:

Deal with debt.

Make a realistic budget.

Make your budget work.

Control your spending and savings.

Talk with a debt counselor about impulsive buying.

Set attainable goals for your financial future.

Don't let the big picture overwhelm you, tackle one bill at a time.

Health Effects of Secondhand Smoke

Secondhand smoke is the combination of smoke from the burning end of a cigarette and the smoke breathed out by smokers. Secondhand smoke contains more than 7,000 chemicals. Hundreds are toxic and about 70 can cause cancer.

Since the 1964 Surgeon General's Report, 2.5 million adults who were nonsmokers died because they breathed secondhand smoke.

There is no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke.

- Secondhand smoke causes numerous health problems in infants and children, including more frequent and severe asthma attacks, respiratory infections, ear infections, and sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS).
- Smoking during pregnancy results in more than 1,000 infant deaths annually.
- Some of the health conditions caused by secondhand smoke in adults include coronary heart disease, stroke, and lung cancer.

What can we do to help prevent secondhand smoke exposure?

Smoke outside—People who smoke inside housing units expose everyone who lives in the unit to secondhand smoke exposure. Not only do those who live in the unit get exposed to secondhand smoke, but those who visit will also be exposed to secondhand smoke. Smoke can linger in housing units for hours until it settles and causes third-hand smoke exposure.

HOME VISITING PROGRAM NEWS

In June Linh Hang graduated from Home Visiting. She started the program in April of 2016 when she was expecting her second child and graduated this June when her daughter Livvy turned three. Linh actively participated in Home Visiting, engaging in the lessons and attending Home Visiting activities regularly with her family. While in the program Linh kept busy and accomplished many goals that she set for herself. Over the past three years she completed an Associate's Degree in Early Childhood Education, worked at Siletz Tribal Head Start here in Salem, had two children and along with Levi Butler bought their first home.

Linh had this to say about the program "The Home Visiting Program has helped us as a family. It kept us on our path of buying our house and accomplishing our goals. Every visit was a reminder of where we were headed and served as a personal reminder of our progress. I definitely recommend Home Visiting to other families; it provides moral support and helps someone who is trying to grow. You have to take the initiative and do the work but the program is really supportive."

Linh is committed to her family and continues to plan and grow for the future.

Our Home Visiting program uses the Family Spirit model and curriculum developed by the John Hopkins Center for American Indian Health and is designed to increase parenting knowledge and skills, link families to resources and provide encouragement to help parents engage in positive parenting. STATE FAIR -SIGNUPS START AUGUST1-9, 2019

You can start calling to sign up on August 1, 2019 and The deadline to sign up for tickets will be August 9 2019, no additional tickets will be purchased after the deadline. Each parent will need to call to sign up his or her own children. You cannot call and sign up for tickets for other people, only your children.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES SIGNUPS START AUGUST1-9, 2019

We will be distributing school supplies to JOM students. When calling in let us know the name of your students and what grades they will be going into. The deadline to call in for school supplies will be August 10, 2019. After that date orders will be filled by the supplies we have remaining. Please leave a phone number where you can be reached, so that we can call and let you know when you may pick up your supplies. We will be distributing the supplies the last week of August.

HIGHER EDUCATION/ ADULT VOCATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM

The deadline to apply to the Tribal Education Programs for school year 2019-2020, was June 30, 2019. All applications received after this date will be held for the next funding cycle, which will be school year 2020-2021, and the deadline to apply is June 30, 2020. It is required for all students to complete your FAFSA (free application for federal student aid) by January 31st, to be eligible to receive Tribal assistance in the Fall you plan on starting school. FAFSA applications now become available on OCTOBER 1, 2019 for the 2020-2021 school year.

ADULT EDUCATION

The Adult Education program is for Siletz Tribal members, 16 years or older, who are not already enrolled in a formal education program. The Adult Education program can assist with the following: Obtaining GED, certificates, or otherwise raise levels of educational achievement through adult classes, improve employment status through education, training, and pursuit of special interest classes. Behavioral Health

In the heat of summer:

Summer plans are established and the weather is being more cooperative than not. Children are embracing their freedom, while parents may be struggling to keep them entertained while also working full-time. Parks with water features are a great source of entertainment. To function well, our brains need to keep cool and hydrated, so be sure to pay attention to signs of heat exhaustion, and carry a water bottle with you.

Boost your mental health in the summer to get ahead of those potential winter blues:

- 1) Exercise—It can be harder to get out an be active with this heat, but it's important to find a way to boost endorphins with at least 30-45 min of cardio-type activity each day. Plan your day; are you more likely to workout in the early morning hours, before it gets hot, or in the evening once it has cooled down?
- 2) It's an important time of year to stay connected with people to keep depression at bay. Try making at least one plan with friends each week, and stick to it (most people routinely want to cancel plans when it gets hot, but try and resist the urge).
- 3) Research says 20 minutes of sunlight a day (don't forget sunblock!) can lift your mood noticeably. What creative ways can you think of to get sun each day? Do some yardwork, perhaps, or take your dog for a walk? Try and get out in it!





MAT SERVICES COMING TO SALEM

The Siletz Community Health Clinic will be offering Medication Assistance Treatment (MAT) in Salem, Oregon soon.

The clinic is contraction with a local provider, Eric Davis, MSW, BCD,LCSW,QMHP, MAC,CADC III, and JD Health and Wellness, to offer MAT services. MAT services to be provided include: medication treatment (SUBOXONE/VIVI

TROL/ANtabuse), mental health counseling, and A&D counseling.

What is MAT: MAT is the use of medications with counseling and behavioral therapies to treat substance use disorders and prevent opioid overdose. MAT is primarily used for the treatment of addiction to opioids such as heroin and prescription pain relievers that contain opiates. (SAMHSA).

Who is eligible for services at the Salem MAT clinic: Siletz tribal members, other Natives, and non-Natives with close family ties. Initially, the program is able to accept 25 patients.

When will services be available: June 2019 (tentatively).
