# Siletz Tribe opposes transmission line, Jordan Cove LNG export facility

In a resolution passed March 15, the Tribal Council of the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians made official its opposition to the planning, approval, construction and maintenance of the Malin to Coos Bay LNG (liquefied natural gas) transmission line and the Jordan Cove LNG export facility in Coos Bay.

This 229-mile liquefied natural gas pipeline from Malin in Klamath County to the export terminal in Coos Bay is being proposed by a Canadian Company, Pembina. The LNG line and export facility will not supply energy to U.S. companies or citizen consumers as the LNG would be shipped overseas from the proposed export facility in Coos Bay.



## Chairman's Report

Region 10 Tribal Environmental Leaders Summit Portland, Oregon; March 6-8, 2019

I was invited to give a welcome address for the convention and to talk about our historical presence in the area. The summit covered issues regarding climate change and how it affects land, water and air. A large delegation of students from various Tribes throughout the Northwest was in attendance, along with many Tribal delegates.

Issues Tribes must deal with are many. There are various opportunities to deal with some of the issues, Congress has passed legislation to assist. Hopefully, funding will reach down to the Tribes.

The Environmental Protection Agency has funded our Tribe for many years for various projects. We have been involved in the cleanup of the lower Willamette River for many years as it is a Superfund site. Tom Downey has represented us at

those meetings (Tom retired in March and we wish him well). We've also received funds for work on the Siletz River basin that our Natural Resources Department has managed.

The Tribe has worked with a local group to address the issue of disposal of bio-solids in the Siletz area. It's very much a local issue that we believe has a detrimental effect on the Siletz River and surrounding land.

Gov. Brown meets with Tribal leaders

The governor graciously invited Tribal leaders to the capital to talk about the "cap and trade" legislation that she is promoting in the current legislative session. The meeting was well-attended by Tribes and the governor's staff.

Tribal leaders then were invited to Mahonia Hall, the governor's home, to talk directly with her on Tribal gaming in

Oregon. All nine Tribes were present and we had a great conversation.

We look forward to future meetings on the same subject and appreciate Gov. Brown's involvement in gaming issues that are so important to all Oregon Tribes.

Chemawa Birthday Pow-Wow

I was pleased to welcome Congressman Kurt Schrader to Chemawa Indian School to celebrate the school's 139 years. Many of our Tribal members attended the school over the years, many are employed at Chemawa to date and many Chemawa graduates have served as leaders of their respective Tribes.

Congressman Schrader had visited the school prior to this visit because concerns have been raised about the school and the land over the years. He is very interested in providing assistance where needed.

We toured the old campus and cemetery at Chemawa then he visited the site

- A veteran or a family member whose veteran is enrolled in the VA only has 72 hours to report a non-emergency room hospital visit so as not to get billed.
- There is a new program for veterans called Veterans Appeal Improvement Modernization Act-forthose veterans who have been waiting too long for their appeal to be addressed. Again, this is a new program.
- For veterans who are enrolled into the VA system – you can also apply to join My Healthy Vet to have access to your local VA doctor, prescriptions, etc. This is a very useful tool.
- Also, some veterans have joined the EBenfits logon application to try and do their VA needs online, but first you must be eligible to apply for VA ben-

efits. I'm here to help you in that VA enrollment process. It's your choice to try EBenefits or let me assist you.

- ➤ The VA can be a very complex program and very trying to one's patience and I have experienced certain road blocks. So please give me a call and I will do everything within my means to make sure you can enroll in the VA system.
- Our VA presumes that spinal bifida in biological children of certain Vietnam-era veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange was caused by the veteran's military service. Eligible children may receive VA benefits.



## Why check my child's hemoglobin?

As part of my role as a consultant nutritionist to Siletz Tribal Head Start, I offer information for families. Today's topic is about the Head Start screening process of checking hemoglobin.

Head Start parents have rights to refuse tests. It is important to be informed about the purpose of the tests in order to make informed decisions regarding the well-being of your child.

What is hemoglobin? It is a protein found in the red blood cells. These cells are responsible for carrying oxygen around the body. In addition to transporting oxygen, hemoglobin carries carbon dioxide out of the cells and into the lungs. Carbon dioxide is then released as a person exhales.

Having low hemoglobin can make it difficult for the body to perform these functions. When the body doesn't have enough red blood cells or when they do notwork properly to transport oxygen, the body doesn't have what it needs to function well. Low hemoglobin is one form of anemia.

Symptoms in children are often different than those experienced by adults. These can include poor neurological development, disturbed behavior, paleness, rapid heartbeat, difficulty learning and low levels of concentration. This is contrasted with the adults who primarily report feeling sluggish and tired.

What causes low hemoglobin levels? Iron deficiency is the most common

cause because iron is also a required part of hemoglobin (its structure). Usually this lack of iron is from not consuming enough iron-rich foods. Even with iron-rich foods, however, sometimes the body has a problem with absorption that causes low hemoglobin.

Common absorption problems in children include gluten intolerance (such as celiac) or lead exposure. In celiac or another digestive disease with malabsorption, not enough iron is absorbed to make hemoglobin.

If lead levels are high, hemoglobin will be low because lead and iron compete for absorption. Lead must be treated in order to allow normal iron absorption. Lead is another test offered in Head Start to support the health of your child.

Interestingly, when children drink excessive milk, they also tend to have low hemoglobin due to the competition of iron and calcium for absorption. That is why they say that pregnant women should not to take their prenatal vitamin with milk.

Women who are menstruating lose iron in their menstrual blood. Pregnant women have an increased need for iron and therefore may also be at increased risk of developing anemia. Children are often at risk if they are born to a mother who was an emicduring pregnancy because the child is born with less stored iron.

People who have chronic health conditions, including autoimmune conditions, liver disease, thyroid disease, inflammatory bowel disease and SIBO (small intestinal bacterial overgrowth) may have lower hemoglobin levels, which increases the chances of developing anemia.

Athletes who do vigorous exercise are also at greater risk as exertion can lead to a breakdown of red blood cells in the blood-stream. In some instances, specific types of genetic disorders such as thalassemia and sickle-cell disease are responsible for this condition. Low hemoglobin also is found in people who have a medical history of alcoholism.

Children with very low iron may also develop a condition called pica, which causes them to eat dirt, chew rocks, chew massive amounts of ice or eat laundry starch. This also occurs in adults and in pregnancy. Pica is reversed when hemoglobin is normalized.

It is important to look for the root cause in order to find the best treatment.

Anemia treatment varies, depending on the cause of the condition. Changes in diet or dietary supplements can help people who have iron deficiency anemia. If the anemia is caused by another condition, treating the underlying disease will often alleviate the problem.

Often, improvement in the level of hemoglobin can be achieved by a diet that is rich in iron. Diet can also help to maximize absorption with other nutrients. Iron-rich foods include meat and fish, dried beans, eggs, dried fruits – such as dates and figs, broccoli, green beans, green leafy vegetables – such as kale and spinach, nuts, seeds and peanut butter.

While consuming iron in foods or supplements is important, specific nutrients such as vitamins C and A can boost the amount of iron absorbed. Foods rich in vitamin C include citrus fruits, strawberries and leafy green vegetables. Taking a vitamin C supplement may also help.

Vitamin A and beta-carotene (the plant form of vitamin A) can aid the body in absorbing and using iron. Foods rich in vitamin A include fish, liver, squash, sweet potatoes, kale and collards. Foods high in beta-carotene include yellow, red, and orange fruits and vegetables, such as carrots, sweet potatoes, squash, cantaloupe and mangos.

Hemoglobin can also be improved by supplementing with prescription or over-the-counter iron. It is important to work with a health practitioner to determine the root cause.

It is also possible to have serious problems from taking too much iron or vitamin A. Furthermore; iron supplementation can cause side effects, such as constipation, nausea and vomiting. Supplements usually cause levels of iron to increase gradually over a few weeks. A doctor may recommend taking the supplements for several months to increase the body's iron stores.

Not all individuals need more iron. There is a disease called hemochromatosis that is an over-storage of iron and if not treated can cause serious health problems. It cannot be diagnosed by checking hemoglobin alone. Interestingly, the author (your Head Start nutrition consultant) has this condition (of too much iron).

Siletz Tribal Head Start offers nutritional support at no cost to Head Start families. This usually occurs over the telephone. If you have questions or nutrition concerns about your Head Start child, please contact your teacher or the director and ask to speak to the nutritionist.



## Tobacco: More than just Nicotine

#### **Tobacco Related Cancers for the Month of April**

**Esophageal Cancer:** Esophageal cancer is cancer arising from the esophagus—the food pipe that runs between the throat and the stomach. Symptoms often include difficulty in swallowing and weight loss. Other symptoms may include pain when swallowing, a hoarse voice, enlarged lymph nodes ("glands") around the collarbone, a dry cough, and possibly coughing up or vomiting blood.

Causes: The two main types (i.e. squamous-cell carcinoma and adenocarcinoma) have distinct sets of risk factors. Squamous-cell carcinoma is linked to lifestyle factors such as smoking and alcohol. Adenocarcinoma has been linked to effects of long-term acid reflux. Tobacco is a risk factor for both types. Both types are more common in people over 60 years of age.

- Improves heart health. It will also lower your blood pressure, improve your circulation and help reduce the risk of heart and lung disease.
- Easy on the joints for those who suffer from joint pain and discomfort. It's a full-body workout that keeps the pressure off your hips, knees and spine.
- Swimming can improve bone mineral density (BMD), which will help fight osteoporosis.
- Increases flexibility, the act of swimming can increase flexibility in your hips, legs, arm and neck. It can also help improve your posture and alleviate back pain.

## I Ask for Consent

What if you want to kiss someone, but you aren't sure how they'd feel? When you want to get close to someone - whether you're hooking up for the first time or in a long-term relationship — it's important to know how to ask for consent.

#### What Is Consent?

- •When someone gives consent, they're giving permission for something to happen or agreeing to do something.
- •This means they need to know specifically what they're agreeing to so make sure what you're asking is clear. For example, "Do you want to mess around for a while? Like cuddling and making out, but not having sex?"

#### When and How to Ask for Consent

- ·Always ask for consent before you begin any sexual activity, including kissing, cuddling, and any kind of sex even if your partner consented in the past.
- •Ask in a way that makes it clear it would be okay if they said "no" otherwise you might be pressuring them to do something they don't want to do.

For example, "Do you want to go back to the bedroom or hang out here and watch movies?"

#### What Is Not Consent?

- ·Your partner may not tell you "no," but that doesn't mean they're saying "yes."
- •If someone says nothing, "um... I guess," or an unsure "yes," they're likely communicating that they don't really want to do the thing you're asking about.
- •In these cases, you don't have clear consent. Check in with your partner about how they're feeling or suggest another activity.

For example, "You seem unsure, so why don't we just watch TV tonight?"

#### Non-Verbal Cues

- ·Pay attention to your partner's body language.
- •If they pull away, tense up, look uncomfortable, laugh nervously, or are quiet or not responding, you should check in. For example, "You don't seem too into this. Do you want to stop or take a break?"

#### Dealing with the "No"

- •Sometimes your partner will say "no," and that's okay.
- •Reassure them that you're glad they can be honest with you. For example, "That's okay; maybe we could do that some other time."

#### Why Consent Matters

- Talking about what your partner wants to do ensures sex is consensual and makes it more enjoyable.
- ·You'll feel more confident about what you're doing, and your partner will feel comfortable getting close to you.

None of this would be possible without the help of the Confederated Tribe of Siletz Indians, the Johnson O'Malley Program and Nick Viles, education specialist at the Eugene Area Office. I am beyond grateful my son has access to this program and can continue to train in a sport he loves.

#### Huffman receives hand-carved ceremonial staff

Tribal member Nora Huffman of Tolowa Court in Siletz was presented with a beautiful hand-carved ceremonial staff at a recent spiritual devotion program held monthly at the Siletz library meeting room and hosted by the Baha'l Faith of Lincoln County.

Larry Love, creator and carver, presented the staff to Huffman and then gave a 15 minute explanation of the founding, creating and carving of the staff to those in attendance. Love, a Baha'l member from Newport, started the presentation with a prayer to the Great Spirit, Mother Earth and animal spirits, and addressed the spirits of the Four Directional. He explained he prayed to the bear, hawk and wolf for guidance, direction, enlightenment and strength.

Love then gave a blessing to the staff for protection of Huffman, who was asked about her new quest with the staff. She replied, "I just want to be of service to the Tribe, to humanity and for anyone who needs assistance."

The staff is almost 6 feet long with art of the bear, hawk and wolf; carved pieces of bark; and a quarter-inch wide path that winds down the length of the staff. Perched on the top of the staff are eight carved extremities resembling fingers with turquoise nuggets on the tips, honoring the four major and the four minor spiritual directions. In the palm of the valley between the "fingers" lies a bed of turquoise and on that bed is a tortoise.

When asked about the time it took to construct the staff, Love quipped, "I quit counting after I hit 300 hours and I'm thinking this will be my last one."

When asked what was the most difficult day of his labor, Love didn't hesitate in saying, "The day I gave over my ideas to a higher power." He added, "Mother Nature, the animal spirits and of course, the Great Spirit led the way after I took myself out of it."

Per the Enrollment Ordinance §2.302 (c)(2) the Enrollment Committee, with the assistance of the Enrollment staff shall post notice of final Enrollment actions taken by the Tribal Council under this ordinance in the same manner it posts notices of proposed actions.

#### Enrollment Ordinance §2.304 (e)(6)

When the Tribal Council approves an application for enrollment, the applicant shall be notified by certified mail, shall be posted as required by Section 2.302(c), and the Enrollment Committee and Enrollment staff shall enter the name of the applicant on the official Tribal membership roll.

If the Tribal Council decides to reject an application for enrollment, the applicant shall be so notified by certified mail and advised of his or her right to appeal in accordance with §2.315 of this ordinance or to request reconsideration of the decision in accordance with §2.314 of this ordinance.

Such Tribal Council decisions shall be enacted in the form of resolution. If the Tribal Council rejects the recommendation of the Enrollment Committee either as to approval or rejection for enrollment, Enrollment staff shall post the council's action in a manner consistent with §2.302(c) and in the Tribal newspaper, so as to notify the Tribal membership of the council's action, and shall notify the applicant and any interested parties by certified mail of the council's action.

Any appeal period for Tribal members who do not receive notice directly by mail of Tribal Council action approving or rejecting an enrollment application shall commence 10 days after notice of such action pursuant to this section was received.

#### Siletz Tribal Court Rules and Procedures Ordinance §3.009(a) Time for Filing

Civil actions to review Tribal Council action, or other Tribal action, shall be presented to the court clerk in writing not more than 60 days after an action of the Tribal Council, or Tribal officials as specified in the Tribal code, is alleged to have violated the plaintiff's right or rights or not more than 60 days after the alleged harm first manifested itself if such harm was not apparent on the date of the Tribal Council's, or other official's, action.

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## North End Senior Solutions: Where everybody knows your name

Clients come to the NESS Club for different reasons.

Some have Alzheimer's or dementia. Interaction with others is beneficial and their caregivers can get some muchneeded respite.

Others have disabilities – physical and cognitive – and the same applies to them. The warm welcome everyone gets when they arrive at NESS (North End Senior Solutions) Club is just the beginning of an active and engaging day. A delicious day too as the club's lunches and snacks are homemade in the kitchen of the International Order of Odd Fellows Hall in Lincoln City, where NESS Club is currently located.

NESS is a "nonprofit organization with the mission to ensure the safety, comfort and well-being of senior citizens and people with disabilities, to help them maintain their independence and fulfill their desire to remain living at home."

In 2017, the organization received a \$2,850 grant from the Siletz Tribal

Charitable Contribution Fundforfood and caregiver training for the adult day service program. Earlier this year, it received a \$2,400 grant for food and supplies for the same program. Overall, NESS has received \$15,330 from the charitable fund since 2011.

NESS Club currently is open Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Clients are encouraged, but not forced, to participate in the day's activities.

"No one likes to be told what to do. You have to protect a person's autonomy. They are in charge," said Executive Director Jan Molnar-Fitzgerald. "Our job is to participate with people—engage, entertain and educate each other—that's what we're there for. We're not there to boss people around"

During one afternoon in October, an unexpected (but no less delightful) musical group had arrived late morning, so lunch was a bit delayed. It was worth the wait – the tossed salad, vegetarian chili and cornbread were wonderful.

Conversation carried on non-stop, with one client, Dee, looking up answers

to questions on her tablet. Next came more music as guitarist/singer Mel Wilson played some tunes, joined by two clients, 95-year-old Bernice on violin and another Mel on guitar. Lots of dancing ensued.

According to Bernice's son, Richard, Bernice had been interested in finding a place to play bridge. They weren't having much luck when Richard's wife, Myrl, saw a poster for NESS Club at the doctor's office. They decided to check it out.

"She (Bernice) likes the service – they wait on her there – and she likes the opportunity to play her violin. It gives us time to do things, work around the house and get out," said Richard. "It's (NESS Club) is a very nice place for seniors and those with disabilities to socialize, participate in activities and feel a sense of community."

The club is just the beginning of the services available. The Handy Buddies program provides in-home services and transportation for things like a doctor's appointment and shopping.

NESS Outreach and Referral can help you find medical providers and/or

the services you need, such as SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program), Lincoln City Food Pantry, Meals on Wheels and community meals.

NESS also provides education/training for dementia awareness/care through the Savvy Caregiver and Powerful Tools for Caregivers programs.

Molnar-Fitzgerald has even grander plans – building an 8- to 10-bedroom facility with a living room, dining room and kitchen – just like a regular home.

"We need to have our own place so people don't need to leave the community when they can't be cared for at home," she says in a video about the planned facility. "... We don't have a skilled nursing facility, so that's what we need to do now. So what we envisioned seven years ago now is really crucial."

#### Siletz Tribal Athletic Commission Vacancy

The Athletic Commission was formed to promote and offer different types of sport activities at the Siletz Tribe's gaming center and/or at other locations on Tribal trust land. The Athletic Commission shall permit and regulate only those sporting activities specifically authorized by Tribal Council and permitted by applicable law. The following activities are authorized by Tribal Council: boxing (amateur and professional), wrestling (amateur and professional) and mixed martial arts (amateur and professional).

The Athletic Commission shall be responsible for regulation of any sporting activity that occurs on Siletz lands to ensure that the conduct of such sporting activity comports with all Athletic Commission regulations and applicable laws.

Athletic Commission members shall be reimbursed for approved travel, subject to the availability of funds.



## Michael R. Courtwright -1956-2019


Tribal member Michael R. Courtwright, age 62, passed away March 11, 2019, at Tacoma General Hospital in Tacoma, Wash.

Pigsley's nomination reads as follows:

In the capacity as Siletz Tribal chairman, Delores has been actively involved in Tribal government, Indian commissions and boards, committees, and in many other government functions and capacities throughout her career.

She has worked closely with the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Indian Health Service, Administration for Native Americans, Department of Labor, many other federal agencies, Oregon governors and local governments.

Delores has been and is currently a tribal delegate to the National Congress of American Indians, Affiliated Tribes of Northwest Indians, past chairman of the Oregon Legislative Commission on Indian Services, the National Indian Gaming Association and many other boards and commissions as well as the chief tribal spokesman.

As chief negotiator for the Tribe, she has successfully negotiated memorandums of understanding, self-governance compacts, Tribal gaming compacts as well as many agreements with federal and local governments, colleges and schools. She has testified before Congress many times on various issues that affect Tribes nationally.

The history of the Tribe since termination in the 1950s to restoration in 1977 has been one of growth and prosperity. Delores served on the Restoration Committee and the Gaming Committee, both landmarks in the Tribe's successful operation and business.

Delores credits the success of her Tribe to all of the past and current Tribal Council leaders, and to many national Tribal leaders serving as mentors. The rebuilding of a Tribe takes leadership and community support.

She was married to Donald Pigsley, a member of the Yankton Sioux Tribe of Wagner, South Dakota. She has three children – Timothy, Troy and Quanna – and seven grandchildren, Don, Troy and Quanna are now deceased.

Delores has served on the Siletz Tribal Council for 40 years in total, 33.5 of those years as chairman. In February, she was re-elected to another three-year term on the council.

Those also receiving DAR awards included Amanda, a blind Coos woman for whom Amanda's Trail in Yachats, Ore., is named; Loretta Hoagland, founder of Neighbors for Kids in Depoe Bay, Ore.; and Mary Clare Smothers, NASA ambassador.

#### Resolution, continued from page 1

WHEREAS, the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians (CTSI) is comprised of all western Oregon Tribes whose ancestral territories include portions of the proposed Pacific Connector Gas Line route, which would transmit LNG from Malin to Coos Bay, and the site of the proposed Jordan Cove LNG export facility; and

WHEREAS, the Court of Claims in 1938 rightly found that the Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Tribes had been removed to, and confederated with other Tribes on the Siletz Reservation; and

WHEREAS, the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians has never ceded its aboriginal title interests to Coos ancestral territory; and

WHEREAS, and the proposed Pacific Connector Gas Line poses multiple major cultural and natural resource and environmental/habitat losses and ongoing threats to not only unceded Coos territory, but throughout its proposed footprint; and

WHEREAS, the proposed LNG transmission line and proposed associated export facility are not in the service of local or national business or energy supply or natural resource interests; now

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians believes that the proposed LNG Transmission Line and associated proposed Jordan Cove LNG export facility will directly negatively affect sensitive aquatic and terrestrial habitat and vitally important species by its construction, many of which would be permanent losses which cannot be mitigated; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that any long-term operation of such proposed LNG transmission line and export facility would pose an ongoing threat of catastrophic failures during a major Cascadia Subduction Zone Seismic periodic event, of which there is a long proven geologic record; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that because of the foregoing concerns, and others, the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians cannot support the planning, approval, construction and maintenance of the Malin to Coos Bay LNG transmission line, or the proposed Jordan Cove LNG export facility, nor the associated proposed Jordan Cove to mouth channel widening, turning basin, and shipping berths proposed for the north shore of Coos Bay, and the CTSI strongly opposes all related planning and construction.

#### **Funded Orthodontic Treatment Screening**



The 2019 Funded Orthodontic Treatment Program is fast approaching! All interested parties should contact the dental department to schedule a screening. The screening dates are April 17 and May 22, 2019

The program and amount of accepted applicants will be dependent on the funding for the year. An additional screening date may be added if the need is great.

Applicants are selected by case severity, motivation of the patient and guardian, reliable transportation, routine dental checkups and the oral hygiene history of the patient, to name a few. We want the best results possible for the patient and thus place emphasis on these items in order to achieve this. The unbiased selection process is performed under the guidance of an orthodontic specialist and chosen through a committee.

Open to all ages who are **CHS-eligible only**. To be eligible for the 2019 program year, you must complete a screening appointment during one of the screening days. Each year's selection process is independent from previous years and does not carry over. Selected and treated individuals can only be selected once for the duration of the program. All applicants will be notified by mail if they have been chosen.





# Merkley offers intern scholarships to increase accessibility for Oregonians

Scholarships available to those who otherwise could not afford the educational opportunity

WASHINGTON – Oregon's U.S. Sen. Jeff Merkley announced earlier this year a newscholarshipprogram to enable Oregonians who could otherwise not afford to participate in a congressional internship to gain experience in his Washington, D.C., and Portland offices.

In addition to the existing Otto and Verdell Rutherford Congressional Intern Scholarship, which is offered to individuals dedicated to addressing inequality, Merkley's We the People Congressional Intern Scholarship will be open to all individuals seeking financial support, extending the opportunity to far more Oregonians to receive financial support while interning on a full- or part-time basis.

"My first public service experience began when I served as an intern for Oregon Sen. Mark O. Hatfield," Merkley said. "I was only 19 at the time and I would never have believed that 33 years later I would return to the Senate to represent Oregon in the seat once held by Sen. Hatfield. As the first in my family to attend college, I have experienced first-hand the lifelong influence a Senate internship can provide.

"My family didn't always have a lot of extra money when I was growing up, so I know that financial considerations can be important to making sure students from all walks of life can access this educational opportunity," Merkley continued. "That's why we've created these scholarships. They will increase the accessibility of intern positions in my offices – offering more students and recent graduates the same unique, life-changing opportunities that my internship afforded me."

Scholarships are available for full-time or part-time internships in Washington, D.C., or a part-time internship in Portland. Scholarship positions last 10-14 weeks during fall, winter, spring and summer terms.

Recipients of a We the People Congressional Intern Scholarship will be a part of the traditional intern cohort and receive the same internship experience as non-scholarship interns. In Merkley's offices, interns are integrated as part of the team and staff invests in facilitating interns' professional development.

## Indian-owned Eighth Generation launches new Two Spirit wool blanket

SEATTLE - Eighth Generation, the first American Indian-owned company to offer beautifully crafted wool blankets, is excited to unveil its latest collaboration with Two Spirit artist Ryan Young (Lac du Flambeau Band of Lake Superior Chippewa).

This vibrant blanket design is based on a painting that calls out to a traditional Ojibwe story about crows.

The story goes that the crow was once very colorful and had a beautiful singing voice, but during a forest fire it spent so much time trying to help the other animalsthatitscolorfulfeathersbecameblackened with soot and its beautiful singing voice turned hoarse from the smoke.

"This story reflects the struggles and sacrifices I have made as a Two Spirit person and all I have worked through to get to a place where I want to teach others," said Young. "While this blanket celebrates Two Spirit people, I envision it as a blanket

guidelines. To be eligible for the program, families must meet the criteria below:

- Siletz Tribal head of household or dependent child
- Family must be considered "at risk" and these factors include:
  - Income below 300 percent federal poverty level for last 30 days
- Households that reside in rural locations that have limited employment opportunities
- First-time parent
- Households with at least one adult without a post-secondary certificate
- Family experienced trauma, chemicaldependencyormental health barriers

Note – Effective Jan. 1, 2019, these guidelines pertain to all newly enrolled families.

## Ask Raven: Marijuana poses risks to lung health


Dear Raven: Is smoking marijuana healthy?

According to the American Lung Association, there are many concerns with smoking marijuana and the impact it has on health.

The American Lung Association cautions the public against smoking marijuana because of the risks it poses to lung health.

Smoke is harmful to lung health. Whether it's from burning wood, tobacco or marijuana, toxins and carcinogens are released from the combustion of materials. Smoke from marijuana combustion has been shown to contain many of the same toxins, irritants and carcinogens as tobacco smoke.

Beyond what's in smoke alone, marijuana is typically smoked differently than to bacco. Marijuanas mokers tend to inhalemore deeply and hold their breath longer than cigarette smokers, which leads to a greater exposure per breath to tar. Secondhand marijuana smoke contains many of the same toxins and carcinogens found



in directly inhaled marijuana smoke, in similar amounts if not more.

Smoking marijuana clearly damages the human lung. Research shows that smoking marijuana causes chronic bronchitis. Marijuana smoke has been shown to injure the cell linings of the large airways, which could explain why smoking marijuana leads to symptoms such as chronic cough, phlegm production, wheezing and acute bronchitis.
