# Oregon State offers enhanced support services to help Native American students earn degrees online

CORVALLIS, Ore. – Oregon State University is increasing its outreach to Native American communities in Oregon and across the country by enabling tribal members to earn college degrees through OSU's nationally ranked online programs.


The new initiative is a partnership between Oregon State Ecampus – the university's renowned online education provider – and OSU's Office of Institutional Diversity to help Native Americans easily navigate the higher education landscape and assist them toward graduation.

"As a land grant institution, OSU is uniquely poised to provide a high-quality, accessible education for all," said Oregon State President Ed Ray. "We value and acknowledge our moral and ethical responsibility to Native Americans, who are the original stewards of this land, and are pleased to advance our mission of service by partnering in developing distance education programs that align with tribal goals."

Nationally, Native American and Alaska Native students had the lowest total college enrollment rate (19%) among all ethnic groups in 2016 according to a report published in February by the National Center for Education Statistics. Meanwhile, Native student enrollment fell by 28% nationwide from 2010 to 2016.

"We are committed to help reverse these trends," said Allison Davis-White Eyes, director of community diversity relations in OSU's Office of Institutional Diversity. "Oregon State hopes not only to raise awareness of online degree programs that are ideal for place-bound students in remote communities, but it is also offering a unique blend of student services to increase retention and degree completion rates."

Marleigh Perez, Ecampus director of student success, will serve as the primary point of contact for each Native student enrolled in a degree program online. Support staff also will include a dedicated Ecampus success coach, who will hold regular one-on-one success coaching appointments to help learners identify support resources, improve academic skills and address obstacles to success.

# Harjo is nation's 23<sup>rd</sup> poet laureate

Librarian of Congress Carla Hayden announced on June 19 the appointment of Joy Harjo as the nation's 23<sup>rd</sup> Poet Laureate Consultant in Poetry for 2019-2020.

Harjo will take up her duties in the fall, opening the library's annual literary season Sept. 19 with a reading of her work in the Coolidge Auditorium.

Harjo (Muscogee Creek Nation) is the first American Indian poet to serve in the. She succeeds Tracy K. Smith, who served two terms as laureate.

"Joy Harjo has championed the art of poetry – 'soul talk' as she calls it – for over four decades," Hayden said. "To her, poems are 'carriers of dreams, knowledge and wisdom,' and through them she tells an American story of tradition and loss, reckoning and myth-making. Her work powerfully connects us to the earth and the spiritual world with direct, inventive lyricism that helps us reimagine who we are."

Harjo currently lives in her hometown of Tulsa, Okla., and is the nation's first poet laureate from Oklahoma.

"What a tremendous honor it is to be named the U.S. poet laureate," Harjo said. "I share this honor with ancestors and teachers who inspired in me a love of poetry, who taught that words are powerful and can make change when understanding appears impossible, and how time and timelessness can live together within a poem. I count among these ancestors and teachers my Muscogee Creek people, the librarians who opened so many doors for all of us and the original poets of the indigenous Tribal nations of these lands who were joined by diverse peoples from nations all over the world to make this country and this country's poetry."

Harjo joins a long line of distinguished poets who have served in the position, including Juan Felipe Herrera, Charles Wright, Natasha Trethewey, Philip Levine, W.S. Merwin, Kay Ryan, Charles Simic, Donald Hall, Ted Kooser, Louise Glück, Billy Collins, Stanley Kunitz, Robert Pinsky, Robert Hass and Rita Dove.

Harjo was born in Tulsa on May 9, 1951, and is the author of eight books of poetry, including Conflict Resolution for Holy Beings (W.W. Norton, 2015); The Woman Who Fell From the Sky (W.W. Norton, 1994), which received the Oklahoma Book Arts Award; and In Mad Love and War (Wesleyan University Press, 1990), which received an American Book Award and the Delmore Schwartz Memorial Award.

Her next book of poems, An American Sunrise, will be published by W.W. Norton in fall 2019.

Harjo has also written a memoir, Crazy Brave (W.W. Norton, 2012), which won the 2013 PEN Center USA literary prize for creative nonfiction, as well as Editor's note: The Chairman's Report will resume in a future issue of Siletz News.

# Toledo PD receives Tribal charitable grant for vests to help protect officers

Since May 25, 2018, there have been a staggering 43 school shootings in the United States. That averages to more than one school shooting every week. School shootings happen in various demographic regions. As a society, it is a sobering fact with the realization that it could happen in our schools someday.

The Toledo Police Department continues to prepare for this situation through training and prevention with the optimism

it may never happen to a school in our area, but with a realistic perception of the need for being ready and equipped in the wake of such an unfortunate event.

The Toledo Police Department trains with local area police agencies on how to respond to active shooters. This ensures a collective interagency response model is developed before an incident happens.

The Toledo Police Department also participates in training exercises with

Toledo Fire and Rescue to develop a quick response element in order to treat victims of an active shooter while simultaneously working to stop the threat.

The Toledo Police Department is also a part of the Lincoln County Student Threat Assessment Team, which helps prevent active shooter situations by assisting the Lincoln County School District in assessing potential threats.

The Toledo Police Department was graciously awarded a grant for \$4,199.93 to purchase seven Active Shooter Kit Vests. The vests contain added armor that protects the officer from high velocity rounds during high risk situations where the use of high caliber weapons is probable.

# Tribal Housing employees among few to achieve national certification

Casey Godwin, Brett Lane and Isaac DeAnda Sr. are enrolled members of the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians and are employed at the Siletz Tribal Housing Department.

On May 9 during the National American Indian Housing Council's (NAIHC) Annual Convention in Denver, Colo., all three employees received the Professional Indian Housing Management certification.

To receive this certification, Godwin, Lane and DeAnda were each required to complete eight courses offered by the NAIHC Leadership Institute, including Indian Housing Management, Financing Affordable Housing Development, Financial Management, Project Management, Supervisory Management, Admissions & Occupancy, Property Maintenance Management and Environmental Compliance.

Each course ended with a two-hour exam, where participants must score 80% or better to receive credit toward certification.

Since the inception of the NAIHC Leadership Institute, a mere 60 Indian Housing professionals have achieved successful completion of the PIHM training track. Previously, Terry Fisher and Jessica Garcia received the same certification, making it five Siletz Tribal members who have received this prestigious certification. Well done!



a children's book, *The Good Luck Cat* (Harcourt, Brace 2000) and a young adult book, *For a Girl Becoming* (University of Arizona Press, 2009).

In addition to her poetry, Harjo is a musician. She plays saxophone with her band, the Arrow Dynamics Band, and previously with Poetic Justice, and has released four award-winning CDs of original music. In 2009, she won a Native American Music Award for Best Female Artist of the Year.

Harjo's many literary awards include the PEN Open Book Award, the American Indian Distinguished Achievement in the Arts Award, the New Mexico Governor's Award for Excellence in the Arts and the Arrell Gibson Lifetime Achievement Award from the Oklahoma Center for the Book.

Harjo has received fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation, the Witter Bynner Foundation and the National Endowment for the Arts. Her collection How We Become Human: New and Selected Poems 1975-2001 (W.W. Norton, 2002) was selected by the National Endowment for the Arts for its Big Read program.

Her recent honors include the Jackson Prize from Poets & Writers (2019), the Ruth Lilly Poetry Prize from the Poetry Foundation (2017) and the Wallace Stevens Award from the Academy of American Poets

Harjo has taught at UCLA and until recently was a professor and chair of excellence at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. She has returned to her hometown where she holds a Tulsa Artist Fellowship.



### Miranda Williams was honored with an Indian Health Service Director's Award

Williams receives national IHS award

for Fostering Relationships on June 21 for her "innovative leadership and dedication towards improving diabetes care."

Williams is the diabetes program coordinator/supervisor Division of Public Health in the IHS Chinle Service Unit (CSU) in Chinle, Ariz. She received her award during the IHS Director's Awards Ceremony at IHS headquarters in Rockville, Md.

The award nomination, submitted by Jill Moses, MD, MPH, director, Division of Public Health, CSU, reads as follows:

"Miranda Williams has worked as the Chinle Service Unit diabetes coordinator for seven years. Within that time, she has developed a nationally recognized innovative diabetes care program that emphasizes building and fostering relationships. Her work exemplifies her dedication to the community she services, where the focus is on patient care, by creating and fostering

a network of support within the health care team and system. Her work demonstrates her ingenious approach to building capacity within the community and relationships. Ms. Williams has achieved the following in the past year through patient centered care programs that develop people, and build and foster partnerships.

"Diabetes Health Coach Development -Ms. Williams' work emphasizes building capacity within the community. The Chinle Diabetes Program has developed the innovative health coach model using Native paraprofessionals to provide navigation, care coordination and self-management support. Health coaches, trained on the job, have become essential members of the primary care team. In the spirit of continuous improvement, Ms. Williams supports professional development among health coaches by ensuring competencies through a system of weekly coaching sessions, peer mentorships and chart reviews resulting in professional development.

"SDPI Partners – Ms. Williams manages over \$1.5 million per year in Special Diabetes of Indians Program Initiative (SDPI) funds. She has implemented an effective system of small 'grants' to CSU departments for activities and services that improve diabetes prevention and treatment. Departments submit proposals containing project plans, evaluation plans and budgets. Once approved, they sign a partnership agreement with the Diabetes Program committing to meeting monthly and reporting progress. Since most departments provide care to patients with diabetes, this approach actively engages our partners in improving diabetes care and supporting SDPI aims. Thirteen departments signed a partnership agreement and received funds in 2018.

"Baa Hozho Care - Under Ms. Williams' leadership, the Diabetes Program was instrumental in developing the Baa Hozho Care program, an intensive care coordination program for patients with complex needs over the past three years. This population is comprised of patents that have been identified as high risk with multiple complex needs, many of which have diabetes. The care coordination processes developed through this program are benefiting all patients with complex needs. A key factor in the success of this service is the strategies developed to effectively engage patients as partners in their own care and strengthening the relationships between patients and their primary care team, including health coaches.

"Mobile Clinic – In response to community requests to bring health care services to remote communities, Ms. Williams championed the design and purchase of a mobile clinic. She met with community members to get their input, researched the use of mobile clinics in the region and designed the clinic to meet community needs. In the past year, she has partnered with multiple hospital departments, community members and partners, and Navajo Nation public health programs to deploy the mobile clinic in a thoughtful and deliberate way.

"Ms. Williams exemplifies the spirit of the IHS Director's Award for Fostering Relationships. Her collaborative approach with compassion and resolve has underscored the application of patient centered care."

She was preceded in death by her son, Michael.


# Robert Shea Thompson-Kirkland – 2003-2019

Because mental health and relapse crises do not always happen during business hours, Siletz Behavioral Health has arranged a collaboration with an afterhours crisis line called Lines for Life.

On weekends and during the weekday hours of 5 p.m. to 8 a.m., the number to the Behavioral Health front desk is forwarded to Lines for Life, where you will be connected with a live mental health counselor.

The counselor will do everything he/she can to help de-escalate, advise and support.

Afterwards, this information can be shared with our mental health counselor so follow-up care can be provided.

Of course, if there is an emergency and you fear that you or someone else is in imminent danger, please call 911. That's always the fastest way to get help.



# AICF publishes free college-going guide for high school students

DENVER, Colo. — The American Indian College Fund, with generous support from the Andrew Mellon Foundation, is publishing an invaluable tool for American Indian high school students seeking higher education. *Native Pathways: A College-Going Guidebook* provides content related to how to get into college, choose a school, pay for it and what to expect the first year in a way that speaks to Native cultures and experiences as students consider attending college.

In addition to content specific to student needs and culture, Native artists and designers contributed to the book. Jonathon Nelson, a member of the Navajo Nation from Hogback, NM, who currently resides in Denver, designed the cover, titled "Kindred Mocs." Nelson's work is featured at badwinds.com.

Photos by Matika Wilbur, from the Swinomish and Tulalip Tribes of Washington, were included. Wilbur is the creator of Project 562, dedicated to photographing the more than 562 federally recognized Tribes in the United States. Amanda Cheromiah, who is Pueblo from Laguna, also provided photos.

The guidebook was created as part of the Native Pathways to College Program, also funded by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. The College Fund launched the program to meet the needs of Tribal communities and in response to the college-going and completion crisis among American Indian and Alaska Native students.

Research shows the national rate of all students going to college within six months of graduating from high school is 70%. For American Indian and Alaska Native students, those numbers are closer to 20%.

The College Fund knows that education improves the lives of individuals, their families and entire communities, yet merely providing scholarships to help students pay for college is not enough for Native students to succeed. To create a college-going culture, the College Fund initiated the program, working with high school students, first-year, students and two-year college students seeking to continue their education at a four-year school.

With a \$2.5 million grant renewal from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, the College Fund will be able to continue efforts to increase college access and success.

"Community, connection and place are central aspects of the Native experience," Davis-White Eyes said. "OSU's online degree offerings through Ecampus are a sensitive response that addresses what is important to tribal communities and individuals."

Oregon State Ecampus serves students in all 50 states and more than 50 countries. Student engagement is a key reason why OSU has been ranked in the Top 10 for online education five years in a row by U.S. News & World Report.

While learning from a distance, Ecampus students have numerous avenues to interact with the OSU community through clubs and organizations. The university's Native American Longhouse Eena Haws is a physical space on the Corvallis campus, but its members — both staff and students — help form a sense of community for anyone no matter where they live.

Oregon State's online classroom is also a place where students build connections with a worldwide network of classmates, as well as those from similar backgrounds.

"The first week of classes, we would have introductions on message boards and I would say I was Penobscot Indian, trying to reach out to other Native students," said Orman Morton III, a Baltimore resident who earned his OSU degree online in environmental sciences. "It was amazing to have four, five, six people in every class say, 'Yeah, I'm Native' and make that connection.

"We formed discussion groups and presented on course topics from a Native American perspective. That was important."



# PUBLICLY Posted from 6/25/2019 to 07/16/2019 Tribal Council Actions Affecting the Tribal Membership Roll POSTING #305

Per the Enrollment Ordinance §2.302 (c)(2) the Enrollment Committee, with the assistance of the Enrollment staff shall post notice of final Enrollment actions taken by the Tribal Council under this ordinance in the same manner it posts notices of proposed actions.

On 6/21/2019 the Siletz Tribal Council by Tribal Resolution made the following 125 actions affecting the Siletz Tribal membership roll. Contact the Enrollment Department for a copy of the Tribal resolutions. This notice has been published on the Tribal website under the Enrollment Postings in the Tribal Member Area.

#### Enrollment Ordinance §2.304 (e)(6)

When the Tribal Council approves an application for enrollment, the applicant shall be notified by certified mail, shall be posted as required by Section 2.302(c), and the Enrollment Committee and Enrollment staff shall enter the name of the applicant on the official Tribal membership roll.

If the Tribal Council decides to reject an Application for Enrollment, the applicant shall be so notified by certified mail and advised of his or her right to appeal in accordance with §2.315 of this ordinance or to request reconsideration of the decision in accordance with §2.314 of this ordinance. Such Tribal Council decisions shall be enacted in the form of resolution.

If the Tribal Council rejects the recommendation of the Enrollment Committee either as to approval or rejection for enrollment, Enrollment staff shall post the council's action in a manner consistent with §2.302(c) and in the Tribal newspaper, so as to notify the Tribal membership of the council's action, and shall notify the applicant and any interested parties by certified mail of the council's action.

Any appeal period for Tribal members who do not receive notice directly by mail of Tribal Council action approving or rejecting an enrollment application shall commence 10 days after notice of such action pursuant to this section was received.

#### Siletz Tribal Court Rules and Procedures Ordinance §3.009(a) Time for Filing

Civil actions to review Tribal Council action, or other Tribal action, shall be presented to the court clerk in writing not more than 60 days after an action of the Tribal Council, or Tribal officials as specified in the Tribal code, is alleged to have violated the plaintiff's right or rights or not more than 60 days after the alleged harm first manifested itself if such harm was not apparent on the date of the Tribal Council's, or other official's, action.
