Addictions are treatable and staff are personally dedicated to providing culturally relevant treatment services.

#### **FEES**

#### Recovery Mentor Outreach

There are no fees associated with Recovery Outreach Mentor services.

#### **Outpatient Treatment**

Siletz Tribal members and other Native Americans who are enrolled in a federally recognized tribe are eligible for services at no cost to them. Third party payments are accepted. Non-tribal clients will be assigned a fee based on a sliding fee schedule.

#### Transitional Living Center

Residents are required to pay 30% of their income for rent and utilities.

## 477—SSP Paid Work Experience

Paid Work Experience will be available to eligible, work ready participants who lack work history, transferrable skills, those that have little to no employment skills and those needing new employment skills.

Participants will be paid for 480 hours.

Support Services may be utilized for work required tools, uniforms (clothing, boots, shoes) and transportation assistance.

- 4. Completes application process to determine eligibility



#### **Pre-TANF / Diverted Services:**

This Program can provide non-recurrent short term Benefits:

- must not exceed 185% of Federal poverty Level for last 30 days
- ♦ Intent is to divert families from becoming TANF participants
- ♦ Expected to have gainful employment within 4 months
- Services will not exceed four months
- Eligible families can receive cash grants based on household size
- Family may be eligible for support services based on barriers identified on case plan

#### **Examples of eligible families:**

- ♦ On unpaid maternity leave
- Short term illness/injury

#### Tribal Temporary Student Assistance Program







## **Tobacco Prevention Program**

Tobacco Related Cancers for the Month of May



#### Melanoma and Skin Cancers:

Melanoma is a cancer that develops in melanocytes, the pigment cells present in the skin. It can be more serious than the other forms of skin cancer because of a tendency to spread to other parts of the body and cause serious illness and death. Because most melanomas occur on the skin where they can be seen, patients or their spouses are often the first to detect suspicious tumors. Caught early, most melanomas can be cured with relatively minor surgery.

#### Bladder Cancer:

Bladder cancer is any of several types of cancer arising from the tissues of the urinary bladder. It is a disease in which cells grow abnormally and have the potential to spread to other parts of the body. Symptoms include blood in the urine, pain with urination, and low back pain. Risk factors for bladder cancer include smoking, family history, prior radiation therapy, frequent bladder infections, and exposure to certain chemicals. The most common type is transitional cell carcinoma. Other types include squamous cell carcinoma and adenocarcinoma.

## **Home Visiting Program**

Children are learning all the time as they play and interact with others and the world around them. Providing a variety of things for your children to explore and play with, things to experience and many interactions with you and others is a perfect way for them to learn. Here are a few things you can try.

#### **Counting Fingers and Toes**

Toddlers love to count their fingers and toes. Count their fingers or toes out loud while pointing to each one. Help them learn how to touch each one only once as you count out loud. As they try it on their own they may count out of order, that is very normal and not important at this stage. The more you count fingers and toes and other objects they will eventually learn the concepts of numbers.

For different variations of this learning activity for toddlers and twos, count the stairs as you go up and down, count bubbles floating in the air, or count the number of plates in the dishwasher.

**Skills learned:** Basic number skills and one-on-one correspondence skills.

#### **Helping Errands**

Little ones love to help, so send your toddler on different "errands" around the house. Have them go get their shoes, take a toy to their room, find their cup, etc. Not only does this give your one-year-old a sense of independence and accomplishment, but they are also learning to listen and follow directions.

**Skills learned:** Understanding directions and memory skills.

#### **Finger Painting**

Finger painting is fun for children of all ages, although it can be a bit messy. If the weather is nice and you can go outside, and you are okay with some mess, then go for it. But if you want to stay inside without a mess, here are some suggestions. Put some tempera paint in a Ziploc bag and let your child squish and spread the paint around through the plastic bag. You might want to use a slightly thicker bag like a freezer bag. You can tape the bag to the table so it stays in one place. If you want something to save you can put a piece of paper in the bag with the paint.

**Skills learned:** Sensory integration - exploring with touch and sight, fine motor skill development as well as creativity.

## **Behavioral Health Program**



#### Spring has arrived!

The saying is, April showers bring May flowers. We experienced snow into the middle of April! As Oregonians, we know we're in for more rain, but here's hope that the flowers will be spectacular. Now is the time to tackle projects that were set aside for the thaw, like doing the bathroom remodel or making that quilt for your loved one you've been meaning to make.

# Sometimes, we experience loss. When we do, it's important to grieve. Here are some aspects of grieving that are natural and completely reasonable:

1) Allow yourself to fully experience the pain of your loss. It can be hard to allow pain in, but it is a natural part of the grieving process. It can be detrimental to your health to avoid that pain, and can even cause long-term damage to your mental health. Grief is a part of life. That being said, it is also okay to put your grief away for a while, especially when it becomes overwhelming.

- Talk with others, particularly people who have experienced a similar type of loss. No one understands how you feel, but people with similar experiences can share how they coped.
- Express your grief through creative processes such as art, dance, music.
- 4) Be sure to keep physically active. It is a hard time to do so, but all the more important to keep mental health struggles such as depression at bay.

For the people of the Siletz tribe, spring is a good time to rekindle the family's passion. Go to pow-wows together, participate in feather dances, go clamming together. Talking circles, sweat lodges and smudging are all traditional medicines that the Siletz people have found quite powerful throughout time.

# Overcoming the Stigma of Mental Illness and Harnessing Your Super Powers!



People living with a BPD patient need to:

- Keep your word
- Encourage responsibility
- Offer honest feedback
- Don't escalate arguments

#### Effects of BPD:

- Substance abuse
- Self-mutilation
- Suicidal behavior
- Depression
- Antisocial
- Eating disorders

#### Treatments for BPD:

- Medication
- Group therapy
- Brief hospitalization
- Psychotherapy



Bipolar Personality Disorder (BPD) is characterized by individuals who may experience unstable moods, exhibit chaotic behaviors, and struggle with daily functioning. Tribal communities play a key role in the healing of their members from the history of colonization, generational and family traumas (i.e., removal of children into foster care or previously, boarding schools). It truly does take a village to facilitate the healing of tribal members through cultural, traditional, and healing arts.

**Symptoms:** (vary from person to person)

Distorted self-image

- Feelings of isolation, boredom, worthlessness, and emptiness
- Mood swings, sometimes severe and sudden
- Feelings of anxiety
- Loss of interest in routine activities
- Suicidal thoughts
- Delusions
- Unstable relationships

**Causes:** Research indicates that BPD is an adult survivor's reaction to childhood trauma. Genetic and environmental factors may play a role.

## **Vocational Rehabilitation Program**

Strengths: Individuals with BPD are highly Creative, Intelligent, and can become Great Leaders, Storytellers, Artists, and Healers! Through the use of their Super Powers, they can bring about positive changes to the social fabric of society.

#### **Self-Care:**

- Find a Support Group to share experiences and feelings
- Explore emotion regulation coping skills (i.e., Dr. Marsha M. Linehan – Dialectical Behavior Therapy – Skills Training Manuals)
- Develop and maintain healthy social relationships by practicing with the group
- Psychotherapy and sometimes, medications can help an individuals' stabilization

Accommodations: Specialized Job Placement – where the individual's behaviors can be accommodated, assignment of a Job Coach or Peer Mentor to facilitate communications, intervene in crisis, and help the individual adjust to their work environment. Show unconditional love and acceptance and keep your word!






