## Barriers to Gaining Independence


Why don't victims of domestic violence "just leave?" Leaving may seem like a simple solution, however, it is rarely that easy. Each abusive relationship and each domestic violence case is complex and the dynamics are unique. There are many reasons why a victim may not be able to, or may not want to leave an abusive partner.

<b>Fear of harm</b> —The victim may be afraid that the abuser will injure or kill a child, loved one, pet, the victim, or themselves.	<b>Hope that the abuser will change</b> —The victim may love the abuser and they may hope that the person will change.
<b>Lack of finances</b> —Victims are often restricted from accessing financial resources, or the abuser may not permit a victim to work.	<b>Personal values</b> —The victim may not want to get divorced or break up the family due to personal or religious values.
<b>Lack of personal support</b> —Abusers often isolate their victims from friends and family, so when the victim is ready to leave, there is no one there to help them out.	<b>Past experience with abuse</b> —A victim may have grown up in an abusive household and have the assumption that relationships are supposed to be that way.
<b>Lack of personal resources</b> —The victim may not have the job skills or education required to support themselves. The victim may not even have a driver's license.	<b>Legal issues</b> —The victim may fear losing their children in a custody battle, or they may fear having to go into a courtroom and talk about the abuse they have suffered.

## Myths and facts about domestic violence

<b>Myth:</b> Domestic violence is not a problem in my community.	<b>Fact:</b> In 2015 there were 857 calls for help made to domestic violence advocacy programs in Lincoln County alone.
<b>Myth:</b> Middle-class women do not get battered as frequently or as violently as poor women.	<b>Fact:</b> Domestic violence occurs in all socio-economic groups. In fact, middle-class women often face barriers to getting public assistance when they decide to leave because of their family's "above poverty line" status.
<b>Myth:</b> Alcohol and drugs cause domestic violence.	<b>Fact:</b> Alcohol and drug use <u>DO NOT</u> cause domestic violence. Domestic violence only happens when a person <u>CHOOSES</u> to abuse.
<b>Myth:</b> Couple's counseling is the solution for domestic violence.	<b>Fact:</b> Domestic violence is a one-time event.
<b>Myth:</b> Couple's counseling is <u>NOT</u> recommended for couples trying to end the violence in their relationships due to the power and control underlying the violence. It is more effective for the batterer to seek treatment, such as batterer's intervention classes alone.	<b>Fact:</b> Domestic violence is the systematic suffocation of another person's spirit. It is a pattern of abusive behaviors that happens over and over and escalates in severity and dangerousness over time.



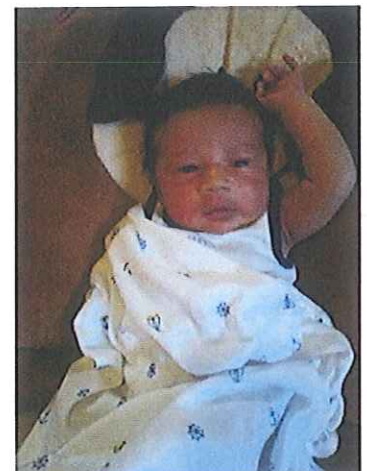



Those clients who are on GA will be suspended for the month of August due to per capita income. No services will be provided for the month of August. Self-Sufficiency activities are not required for August. July Self Sufficiency and Monthly Report Forms are still due by August 5<sup>th</sup>.

Those clients who are on TANF and are a one parent family will receive a grant if you have not received a program disqualification. Two parent (Siletz) families will be over the resource limit and will be suspended for the month of August. Self Sufficiency activities will be required of one parent households. July Self Sufficiency and Monthly Report Forms are still due by August 5<sup>th</sup>.

When calling, if I am not available, please leave a message. For JOM activities youth must be nine years old to attend without a chaperone. **You must call Sonya to sign up for all JOM activities.**

We will again have State Fair tickets and school supplies available this year. They will be on a first come first serve basis.

If you call and sign up for activities or tickets, please come and pick up the tickets. Each year we have a limited number of tickets available and have tickets that are not picked up. This is unfair to families that were not able to receive tickets and may prohibit you from receiving tickets in the future.

*When picking up tickets and school supplies, please allow time to fill out update forms for each of your children. We are required to have current information on all JOM students. No tickets or supplies will be distributed without updated information, this is a program requirement, so please allow the necessary time.*

## Beach Trip

We will be going to the beach on August 18, 2016. We will be leaving at 9:00am. We will have limited transportation available on the vans and youth must be 9 years old to ride on the van without a chaperone. Please call Sonya by August 12, 2016 to sign up.

## State Fair

We will have tickets for families to attend the Oregon State Fair. *These tickets are for JOM eligible families only.* You must pre-register for the tickets. They are general admission tickets. *The deadline to sign up for tickets will be August 5, 2016, no additional tickets will be purchased after the deadline.* Each parent will need to call to sign up his or her own children. *You cannot call and sign up for tickets for other people, only your children.*

## School Supplies

We will be distributing school supplies to JOM students. When calling in let us know the name of your students and what grades they will be going into. **The deadline to call in for school supplies will be August 8, 2016. After that date orders will be filled by the supplies we have remaining.** Please leave a phone number where you can be reached, so that we can call and let you know when you may pick up your supplies. We will be distributing the supplies the last week of August.





### **TYEE Program**

### **HIGHER EDUCATION/ADULT VOCATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM**

The Tribal Higher Education program operates on a one-time per year application deadline. The deadline for Fall Term 15 was June 30, 2016. If you missed the deadline, the next funding cycle is for Fall 2017 and the deadline is June 30, 2017.

### **ADULT EDUCATION**

The Adult Education program is for Siletz Tribal members, 16 years or older, who are not already enrolled in a formal education program. The Adult Education program can assist with the following: Obtaining GED, certificates, or otherwise raise levels of educational achievement through adult classes to improve employment status through education/training. There is no deadline to apply for classes. For an application, please call **SONYA** at (503) 390-9494.

### **Siletz Tribal Youth Activity Fund**

Helps to fund programs for Siletz tribal youth in the many areas such as: sports, music, camp fees, lab fees, shop supplies, graduation, educational /scholastic materials, cultural supplies and materials, correspondence courses, and extra-curricular supplies. Siletz Tribal members from kindergarten to high school can access up to \$75.00.

### **Siletz Tribal Head Start Program**

Is a preschool program for children 3 to 4 years old. The Salem Center has AM and PM classes. It operates Monday through Thursday for 3.5 hours a day. Transportation depends on residency, which will be determined after acceptance. Register in Spring for the following school year. ### **Incentive Awards For Siletz Tribal Graduates**

*Naytlh - 'a "We Carry the Children"*

Our home visiting program provides parenting and life skills for successful and positive parenting. We serve native families that are expecting or have infants under the age of twelve months, continuing through the child's third birthday. The model and curriculum we provide is called Family Spirit and was developed by the John Hopkins Center for American Indian Health. We are funded by the Tribal Maternal, Infant, Early Childhood Home Visiting Program (TMIECHV).

Family Spirit is evidence based and culturally sensitive to native families. Parents gain knowledge and skills for their developing infant through 36 months of age. We also focus on goals and healthy living for parents as a support system for the family as a whole. The program consists of 63 lessons over a 39 month period and is divided into six modules; Prenatal Care, Infant Care, Your Growing Child, Toddler Care, My Family and Me, and Healthy Living. Lessons vary from 30 minutes to 90 minutes and are delivered in the comfort of your home.

As a thank you for participating in our voluntary program we offer some incentives which we will be happy to share with you upon enrollment in the program. If you would like to get more information and or meet our home visiting staff we would love to schedule a home visit to give you a full overview of the program.

If you are expecting a child or have an infant less than twelve months old please give me a call to find out more about the program. I look forward to meeting you!

# Siletz Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation Program



The Siletz Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation program (STVRP) is here to assist **members of any federally recognized Tribe** (living within the Siletz Tribes service area) with overcoming impediments to employment. We work with a diverse population of individuals who have disabilities ranging from cognitive impairments to physical limitations.

If you have a documented disability that creates limitations or prevents you from doing the work you desire or are qualified for we would like to assist you. We can assist with obtaining and maintaining employment and developing skills. We focus on motivation, identifying your abilities, skills that lead to successful employment and the development of self advocacy.

You should have a strong desire to work and be willing to work collaboratively with STVRP staff to provide you with the services needed to overcome your disability. Your personal goal should be self sufficiency and to live a healthy sustainable lifestyle.

The STVRP also assists transitioning students with disabilities. The ideal age for a student to start working with VR is two to three years before graduation, until the age 22, or graduated from high school. Our program can provide vocational guidance and counseling; assist with identification of employment goals; employment retention; and advocacy within the academic environment. Students with a documented disability or who are on an "Individualized Education Plan-IEP" or on a "504 Plan" are encouraged to participate in the STVRP. Examples of SERVICES PROVIDED by STVRP:

- Guidance and Counseling
- Referral to Services
- Employment Services
- Portfolio Building, Resume Writing, Interviewing Techniques, Job Coaching
- Culturally Relevant Individualized Services
- Evaluations and Assessments
- Training Placement Opportunities
- Adaptive Equipment

**Want help getting a job? Do you have a diagnosed disability (IEP or 504)?**

**You could be eligible for STVRP services.**

**Steps in working with Siletz Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation Program:**

**Step 1:** Establish contact with the STVRP Counselor assigned to your school and schedule a meeting. Your first meeting with a STVRP Counselor will be to gather information about you, your needs, and to discuss whether the STVRP fits for you.

If the program is for you.....

**Step 2:** Sign an application and a STVRP Counselor will determine whether or not you're eligible for services by talking with you about your needs, your disability, and what barriers you have as a result. They may also need to do some additional testing and will read through your school records.

**Step 3:** Once you're eligible, you'll meet with your STVRP Counselor to discuss your goals and plans for employment. STVRP Counselors can provide guidance and counseling to students who need help determining their goals or plan for what they want after high school.

**Step 4:** You'll also work with your STVRP Counselor to discuss the impact of your barriers as you work to reach your employment goals and determine what services are necessary to help you reach your goals.
