Applications are now being accepted for the 2017-2018 school year. We have Head Start Centers in Portland, Siletz, Lincoln City and Salem.




# Summer's Bounty

By now, most gardeners have been enjoying the fruits of their hard work, and PAO's Healthy Traditions, Garden Club is no exception. For the next few months we will be featuring the gardens of Siletz tribal members, starting with Sherry Addis' garden.

# **Planning the Garden**

Since my proposed garden area is partially shaded. I made a "sun map" of my garden, to find where I had 6 or more hours of sun. Early one morning, I drew rough lines where the sun is shining or where shadows are cast with a note as to the time. I repeated this every hour until the sun is passed the area. Then I could see where to site the garden.

I was inspired by a garden plan below, that I saw in the book: "Starter Vegetable Gardens, 24 No Fail Plans for Small Organic Gardens". I chose "The easy care bag garden", which



allowed me to incorporate "no weed gardening techniques", that reduce weeds by disturbing the soil as little as possible.

# **Planting the Garden**

Last year, I removed the grass with a weed eater, placed landscape fabric over the garden

area, placed twelve 40lb. bags of soil, and then planted as directed.

This year, I replaced the bags with raised beds and, used the soil from last year (1 part) mixed with new soil (2 parts) and fertilized. Next, I planted: 2 tomatoes, 2 eggplant, 4 peppers, and 1 kale that were grown from seed by our HT group. I transplanted: Thyme, sage, chives, basil, day lily, verbena, dahlias, and marigolds to complete the garden. So far this year, the garden is thriving, and I have only pulled 3 weeds!

# Signs Your Toothbrush Has Seen Better Days

Do you know when it is time to replace your toothbrush?

They say it is every three months, but that is not always a perfect way of knowing. For the most accurate determination, you need to look at your toothbrush. If you notice that the bristles are splayed out, this is a good sign for replacement. The bristles will also become more translucent in most cases. You want bristles that are straight and soft in order to get the most debris off of your teeth. If this is not what you have, it is time to invest in a new toothbrush or a new head if your toothbrush is powered. Be good to your teeth and gums, you want them to last a life time!



More people can be found around sources of water, and if you haven't reserved space at the coast, you may not get in that camping trip (happened to me last weekend!) With the heat comes an increase in irritability as our bodies naturally dehydrate. To help combat that irritability, remember to drink more water than you want to, take breaks, and seek out shade to rest in.

## **Summer experiences:**

Many activities are being held by various programs in the Siletz tribe. One activity I got the honor of participating in recently was the 9 Tribes Suicide Prevention camp hosted by the Klamath tribe, June 19th—23rd. 11 youth from the Siletz tribe joined many youth from most of the other 9 tribes at Mountain Lakes Bible Camp and the surrounding areas, such as Crater Lake. Activities included learning how to make moccasins and hand drums, zip lining Traditional Coping or a boat ride, and an adventure to Crater Lake where some youth jumped into the freezing Siletz Powwow. This year it is August 10-12 cold water!
